T.N. Governor asks Vijay to give proof of majority

Arlekar asks TVK chief to produce letters showing support of 118 MLAs as he stakes claim to form government; Cong. snaps its 20-year-old ties with DMK to back Vijay; AIADMK declines support

Tamil Nadu Governor Rajendra Vishwanath Arlekar is learnt to have asked Tamil Nadu Vetri Kazhagam (TVK) president C. Joseph Vijay, who on Wednesday evening staked claim to form the next government, to produce letters demonstrating support of 118 MLAs, the majority mark in the 234-member Assembly.

Earlier, the Congress, which won five seats as part of the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam alliance, snapped its over 20-year-old ties with the Dravidian major and extended support to the TVK. It is learnt the party could be offered two Cabinet berths if the TVK forms a coalition government.

The TVK won 108 seats in the Assembly election. Mr. Vijay has to resign one of his two seats, while one of the MLAs-elect would become the Speaker, who can vote only during a tie. Hence, with the Congress's backing, the coalition's numbers will only be 111 and the TVK needs the backing of seven more legislators.

Mr. Vijay, along with the party's senior leaders, met the Governor, who arrived in the afternoon from Kerala, where too he holds the gubernatorial post. At the Lok Bhavan, sources said Mr. Arlekar asked Mr. Vijay to demonstrate the numbers before he could be invited to form the government. Legally, the Governor is entitled to satisfy himself about such proof since the cumulative number of legislators belonging to the DMK front

DMK rejects overtures from AIADMK

The AIADMK is learnt to have sent feelers to the DMK seeking support to

form a government in Tamil Nadu where the recent election threw up a hung Assembly. The DMK leadership, however, gave short shrift to the

proposal, sources said. The DMK "was firm on sitting in the Opposition", as it was not interested in going against the people's mandate.

(68) and the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (AIADMK) front (53) exceed those of the legislators backing Mr. Vijay.

The Governor also dissolved the 16th Tamil Nadu Legislative Assembly with effect from Tuesday.

AIADMK senior leader K.P. Munusamy, following a meeting of legislators and functionaries chaired by party general secretary Edappadi K. Palaniswami, categorically told journalists that reports claiming the AIADMK would support the TVK "were not true". The DMK's allies, the Communist Party of India (Marxist), the CPI, and Viduthala Chiruthaigal Katchi, which won two seats each, said the TVK had reached out to them

separately seeking support. But leaders of these parties said they would decide only after internal party meetings to be held in due course. Another DMK ally, the Indian Union Muslim League, with two MLAs-elect, had earlier announced it would not extend support to the TVK.

Announcing the TVK-Congress alliance, AICC Tamil Nadu in-charge Girish Chodankar said it was "founded on mutual respect and shared responsibility between the two parties". This move was not only for the formation of the government "but also for future elections to local bodies, the Lok Sabha, and the Rajya Sabha". The "support shall be conditional upon the TVK keep-

ing out from this alliance any communal forces that do not believe in the Constitution of India".

Mr. Chodankar said the TVK and the Congress would strive to bring back Kamaraj's glory days in the State, with a strong commitment to Periyar's social justice ideals and Ambedkar's constitutional ideals. "Mr. Vijay and Rahul Gandhi jointly pledge to respect this historic verdict of the people of Tamil Nadu for a secular and progressive government, and to fulfil the dreams and promises of the people," he said.

Ahead of AICC visit, jockeying for CM's post on in Kerala

With All India Congress Committee (AICC) observers Mukul Wasnik and Ajay Maken set to individually hear members of the Congress Legislature Party in Kerala on Thursday, jockeying by seemingly anonymous groups for the party's "competing" Chief Minister probables seemed to reach its zenith on Wednesday.

For one, in an open letter to party leader Rahul Gandhi, a group under the banner of "Concerned Citizens of Kerala" argued that the Leader of the Opposition in the previous Assembly, V.D. Satheesan, was the architect of the United Democratic Front (UDF)'s historic win and hence the Chief Minister's mantle should fall on him naturally.

Leaders of electorally significant social groups also seemed to have emerged as powerful behind-the-scenes figures in the Congress's leadership tussle, with Nair Service Society (NSS) general secretary G. Sukumaran Nair appearing to broadcast his "disapproval" of "certain positions" of Mr. Satheesan, and refusing to attribute the UDF's landslide victory to any one leader, saying that "democracy won".

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Suwendu's aide among 3 killed as post-poll violence rocks Bengal

Amid a rise in post-poll violence in West Bengal, unidentified assailants shot dead a close aide of Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leader Suwendu Adhikari in North 24 Parganas district on Wednesday.

The latest incident takes the number of deaths in the State linked to violence after the Assembly election results were announced on Monday to three.

Chandranath Rath, the personal assistant of Mr. Adhikari, was reportedly shot three times at point-blank range in the Madhyamgram area. Mr. Rath was rushed to a hospital where he was declared dead. Earlier in the day, Mr. Adhikari, who is the front runner for the post of Chief Minister, had appealed for calm.

The BJP registered a massive mandate in the election and Mr. Adhikari defeated Trinamool Congress leader and outgoing Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee in Bhabanipur.

A BJP worker, Madhu Mondal, died after being allegedly beaten up by Trinamool cadres during a victory procession in New Town on Tuesday evening, while Trinamool worker Abir Sheikh was hacked to death, allegedly by BJP activists, in Birbhum the

same day. There have been reports of more deaths in violence, including one in Howrah, which the police have not confirmed yet.

Several Trinamool offices have been vandalised over the past three days, while some were painted saffron to thwart attacks. The Director-General of Police, Siddh Nath Gupta, said 500 companies of Central forces remain deployed across the State to contain post-poll violence. The police have arrested 433 people across the State.

Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar on Wednesday directed the West Bengal Chief Secretary, DGP, and Central Armed Police Forces deployed in the State to ensure zero tolerance towards post-poll violence by anyone. He directed the authorities concerned to immediately arrest those involved in violence and vandalism.

On Tuesday night, bulldozers razed multiple structures in Kolkata's iconic New Market, triggering panic among shopkeepers who downed shutters. According to reports, the prime target was the Trinamool's union office, which was demolished.

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Nicobar gram sabhas signed off on infra project without 50% quorum

The Andaman and Nicobar Islands (A&NI) administration did not achieve the mandated 50% quorum at the gram sabha meetings held to get consent for the Centre's ₹92,000-crore Great Nicobar Island project. Instead, it claimed to have done so by attendance figures ranging from 2% to 15% of the population, which, it argued in the Calcutta High Court, counted as "proper quorum". The submissions were made by the administration in an affidavit to the Bench that is hearing a batch of petitions alleging that procedures under the Forest Rights Act (FRA) had been violated in obtaining consent for the project. Quorum is the minimum number of members

needed in such a meeting to reach a decision. According to the rules issued by the Centre for the implementation of the FRA, a quorum at a gram sabha is achieved only if 'one-half' or 50% of the adult population of that village is in attendance, of which one-third must be women.

The administration submitted that meetings were held for Campbell Bay,

Laxmi Nagar, and Govind Nagar gram panchayats, covering seven villages, on August 12, 2022. The Campbell Bay meeting was attended by 105 people, the one in Laxmi Nagar by 163 people, and the Govind Nagar sabha had 81 people. The administration said all three meetings passed "unanimous" resolutions consenting to the project.

Compared to the popu-

lation of these gram panchayats as per the 2011 Census, the strength of the Campbell Bay meeting was 1.83% of the total population of 5,736, that of the Laxmi Nagar was 14.72% of the population of 1,107, and the attendance at the Govind Nagar meeting was 11.98% of the population of 676. Put together, 349 people (4.6%) signed off on the project at these three gram sabhas meant to represent seven villages, whose total population stood at 7,519 as of 2011.

The submissions, which were taken on record by the High Court on Wednesday, came after the Centre sought time from the court to "demonstrate that consent has been taken from the tribal people".

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Trump pauses Hormuz move; says war will end if Iran agrees to deal

U.S. President Donald Trump on Wednesday paused "Project Freedom", launched on Monday and aimed at guiding stranded merchant ships through the Strait of Hormuz, citing "great progress" in talks with Iran. He added that the war could end if the Islamic Republic signed a deal, warning that the U.S. would resume bombing if it did not.

When Mr. Trump announced the operation on Monday, he said any Iranian response would be dealt with "forcefully". Iran claimed that it fired at two U.S. destroyers in the strait and pushed them back while the UAE said it was attacked twice by missiles and drones and one of its tankers came under fire.

Then came Mr. Trump's pause. "Based on the request of Pakistan and other countries... and... the fact that great progress has been made toward a complete and final agreement with Iran, we have mutually agreed that, while the blockade will remain in full force and effect, Project Freedom will be paused for a short period of time to see whether or not the

agreement can be finalised and signed," Mr. Trump said in a social media post.

'Peace advanced'
Pakistani Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif welcomed Mr. Trump's announcement, saying it advanced "regional peace, stability, and reconciliation".

Iran's Ministry of Foreign Affairs confirmed that Washington and Teh-

ran had exchanged proposals in recent days.

In an interview, Esmail Baqaei, Foreign Ministry spokesperson, said Tehran was currently reviewing the American response to its proposal and would present its response through Pakistani mediators.

Iran effectively closed the Strait of Hormuz after the U.S. and Israel started attacking the country on February 28. Active fighting came to an end on April 8, when Mr. Trump announced a ceasefire. But on April 12, the U.S. imposed a blockade on Iranian ports, heaping economic pressure on the country.

Capital tops metros in crimes by juveniles

Delhi recorded the highest number of crimes committed by juveniles among all metropolitan cities in the country, according to the National Crime Records Bureau's (NCRB) 'Crime in India 2024' report released on Wednesday. The national capital and 18 other metropolitan ci-

ties also recorded a slight uptick in the number of crimes by juveniles in 2024 compared to 2023 figures, the report stated. As per the NCRB data, Delhi reported 2,306 cases of crimes committed by minors in 2024. This is slightly higher than the 2,278 cases recorded in 2023, but below the 2,336 cases recorded in 2022. Delhi reported the high-

est number of such crimes, far ahead of other metropolitan cities such as Chennai (466), Bengaluru (386), Hyderabad (316), and Ahmedabad (295). Crimes against elderly The Capital also reported a decline in crimes against senior citizens between 2022 and 2024, though it still recorded the highest number of such cases

among all metropolitan cities. In 2024, Delhi reported 1,267 such cases, down from 1,361 in 2023 and 1,313 in 2022. Mumbai reported the second-highest number of such crimes at 791, followed by Bengaluru (660), Kochi (263), and Nagpur (204). Meanwhile, Delhi's rate of filing chargesheets in these cases was only 51.6%, the report stated.

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SC should take cognisance of Bengal election, make counting videos public: SP

Party chief Akhilesh Yadav claims what happened in West Bengal could be replicated on a larger scale in U.P. Assembly election next year; declines comment on Cong. leaving DMK for TVK in T.N.

Days after the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) won the Assembly election in West Bengal, Samajwadi Party (SP) president Akhilesh Yadav on Wednesday raised doubts about the fairness of the poll process and demanded that the Supreme Court order the video recording of vote counting be made public.

"When court proceedings have gone live, why can't vote counting go live?" Mr. Yadav said. "Why is CCTV not live? Why are they so afraid of it? We demand the Supreme Court immediately take cognisance of the West Bengal poll and put the video of the counting in front of the people of the country," he said.

He alleged that what happened during the election in West Bengal could be replicated on a larger scale in Uttar Pradesh, where the Assembly poll is

scheduled next year.

The SP chief added that when his party comes to power in Uttar Pradesh, the government in Delhi will go. "We have defeated them in U.P., which is why their election mafia will target us. We are alert but will not disclose any strategy to you [media]."

Mr. Yadav also dismissed party leader Kironmay Nanda's recent statement. Mr. Nanda had claimed that the SP president did not go to West Bengal as he received feedback that Trinamool Congress chairperson Mamata Banerjee was

On whether he would reach out to the NDA's allies, JD(U) leader Nitish Kumar and TDP leader Chandrababu Naidu, Mr. Yadav said, "If Nitishji recognises me, he will come with us, while he [Mr. Naidu] has our 'cycle' [election symbol]."

I-PAC termination

Mr. Yadav added that his party severed its association with the political consultancy firm, Indian Political Action Committee (I-PAC), due to shortage of funds. He dismissed speculation that the termination of contract was because of the recent election results. The SP chief said the party had engaged I-PAC for a brief period ahead of the 2027 State Assembly poll but could not continue the arrangement. "They worked with us for a few months, but we are not able to continue because we do not have that kind of funding," he said.

Hindi exam for Maharashtra govt. employees triggers row

Marathi language groups and the Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS) have opposed a State government notification announcing Hindi examinations for its employees.

According to the notification, a Hindi exam will be held for gazetted officers and non-gazetted employees of the government on June 28 at four centres.

Language groups have threatened protests and the burning of the notification if it is not withdrawn within a fortnight.

'Conducted annually'

The government has said the exams are conducted every year and are mandatory only for employees who did not study Hindi in Class 10. Salary increments of employees will be withheld if they fail to clear the examination, which must be passed within three years of joining service, said the notification.

"This is part of the three-language policy accepted by the State many years ago. These exams have been conducted since 1951. They are held twice a year and mandatory for those employees who did not study Hindi till Class 10 as their third language, not mandatory for all employees. Typically, 2,000 to 2,500 government employees of all ranks give this exam annually. And the pass percentage is very high," Arun Gite, director of the Directorate of Languages, told *The Hindu*.

Defending the notification, the ruling BJP said it was important for govern-

ment officials to know Hindi. NCP leader Amol Mitkari also said Hindi is the national language and it is important for officials to know it.

Notification on exam

Last month, the Directorate of Language issued a notification announcing a Hindi exam for its gazetted officers and non-gazetted employees. The examination will be held in Mumbai, Pune, Nagpur, and Chhatrapati Sambhajinagar. The notification asks candidates to submit applications by May 20. The lower grade examination is based on the Class 10 *Lokbharati* textbook, while the higher grade examination draws from the Class 10 *Kumarbharati* textbook, with the second paper's syllabus remaining unchanged.

However, the Raj Thackeray-led MNS and the Marathi Bhasha Abhyas Kendra (MBAK) opposed the move. The MNS has threatened to not allow the examination to take place. The MBAK has also demanded that the State go-

vernment withdraw the notification, failing which it would face protests.

'Imposing Hindi'

"We intend to oppose it till the government revokes it. Our logic is that the Directorate of Language was formulated by [late CM] Yashwantrao Chavan for the development of Marathi. Rather than doing that genuine and core work, the Directorate is trying to impose Hindi. Recent migrants should make all possible efforts to learn Marathi. There is no need for any government employee to learn Hindi. We appeal to the gazetted officers to show some spine and not adhere to this norm. They should go for civil disobedience. By the end of this month, the government should withdraw this notification which insults the sentiments of the people of Maharashtra. If it doesn't withdraw it, we will burn the notification in front of the Collector office," MBAK head Deepak Pawar told *The Hindu*.

Varsha Gaikwad seeks roll-out of Shakti Bill soon

Mumbai Congress president and MP Varsha Gaikwad has written to Maharashtra Governor Jishnu Dev Varma seeking urgent intervention over alleged rise in crimes against women and girls in the State and immediate enactment of the Shakti Bill.

In the letter dated May 5, Ms. Gaikwad also urged the Governor to direct the State government to take strict action to curb atrocities against women.

Awaiting assent

The Shakti Criminal Laws (Maharashtra Amendment) Bill, 2020, modelled on the Disha Act of Andhra Pradesh and other similar laws, was passed by both Houses of the State Legislature in 2021 during the tenure of the Maha Vikas Aghadi government, the Congress leader said. The Bill is awaiting the President's assent.

Her request comes amid massive protests over the alleged rape and murder of a four-year-old girl at Nasrapur village in Pune district. "Neither are girls safe in schools nor are women safe in their own homes," the Mumbai North Central MP stated in the letter.

Ms. Gaikwad also criticised the State government for not having a full-time Home Minister, pointing out that Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis is holding multiple key portfolios, including Home.

"The absence of a dedicated, full-time Home Minister has placed an unbearable burden on the law and order machinery," she said.

Anti-sacrilege law: Mann begins 4-day 'Shukrana Yatra'

An eight-year-old girl was mauled to death by a pack of stray dogs in a village in Punjab's Hoshiarpur district on Wednesday morning, the police said. The deceased has been identified as Saloni, a native of Uttar Pradesh currently residing at Kharal Khurd village under Tanda police station. The incident took place around 8.30 a.m. when the girl had stepped out of her house before leaving for school. On the way, stray dogs surrounded her and mauled her, the police said. She was rushed to the Community Health Centre in Tanda, where doctors declared her dead on arrival, they said. **PTI**

Atul Bora unanimously elected as AGP leader in House; party backs Himanta as head of govt.

Asom Gana Parishad (AGP) president Atul Bora was on Wednesday unanimously elected as its legislature party leader by the newly elected MLAs.

The elected legislators also proposed the name of Himanta Biswa Sarma of the BJP to lead the new government. In the 2026 Assembly election, the ruling BJP won 82 of the 126 seats, and its allies Bodoland People's Front (BPF) and the AGP pocketed 10 seats each. The first meeting of the AGP legislature party was held here earlier in the day.

"Participants of the meeting expressed gratitude to people of the State for their overwhelming

support to the AGP and its allies. Tributes were also paid to the martyrs of the Assam Agitation," Mr. Bora said. The AGP was formed in the aftermath of the six-year-long Assam Agitation against illegal foreigners.

Retained seats

Mr. Bora said the legislature party unanimously elected him as its leader, and working president Keshab Mahanta as deputy leader in the Assembly. Mr. Bora and Mr. Mahanta retained their Bokakhat and Kaliabor seats, respective-

ly, in the election. They were also Cabinet Ministers in the two previous NDA governments.

The party president said Dimoria MLA Tapan Das has been chosen as the legislature party's secretary and Bajali legislator Dharmeswar Roy as the chief whip. Both are first-time legislators.

"Keeping in mind the tremendous developmental work done by Himanta Biswa Sarma as the Chief Minister in the last government, our legislature party unanimously proposed his name to lead the new government. The MLAs also pledged to work for the development of their respective constituencies as well as the State and its indigenous people," Mr. Bora said.

In topsy-turvy Haryana politics, Sonipat latest amphitheatre for BJP-Cong. fight

Bharatiya Janata Party's Rajiv Jain, the outgoing mayor of Sonipat Municipal Corporation and the party's nominee for the May 10 mayoral poll, made an unannounced visit to Nirankari Bhawan on Railway Road on Sunday.

Skipping the usual cavalcade and crowd of supporters, Mr. Jain attended a 'satsang' (religious gathering) before kicking off a packed day of campaigning, with around 30 'nukkad sabhas' (public meetings) planned across the municipal area till midnight.

A veteran of four decades in politics, Mr. Jain is contesting his fourth election. The husband of former Haryana Urban Local Bodies Minister Kavita Jain touched the feet of the saint before sitting with devotees on the carpet. After listening to the discourse for a few minutes, he greet-

ed men, women and children in attendance, shook hands with the staff, and left in his car.

Relying on work

Locked in a prestige battle with Congress's Kamal Dewan, Mr. Jain said he was relying on his public image and the work done during his nine-month stint as mayor after winning the bypoll in March last year. "I focused on laying drinking

water and sewage lines and fixing the roads. A sanitation drive was held every weekend for 40 weeks. We also installed street lights in several parts of the city," he said.

Mr. Jain said 175 development projects were inaugurated during his tenure, with work orders for 40 more in the pipeline. Congress's Nikhil Madan, now a BJP MLA from Sonipat, had won the mayoral



poll to the Sonipat Municipal Corporation in 2020. However, he joined the BJP before the 2024 Assembly poll, necessitating the by-poll to the municipal corporation, the third richest in Haryana with an annual budget of ₹625 crore and over three lakh electorate.

Having lost the by-poll to Mr. Jain with a margin of 34,749 votes last year, Mr. Dewan, renominated by his party for the election, said

the circumstances were "very different" last year. "The by-poll was held soon after Congress' defeat in the Assembly polls. Also, it was only a mayor's election and not the entire municipal corporation and, therefore, turnout was abysmally low around 27%," said Mr. Dewan, son of late MLA Dev Raj Dewan.

Exuding confidence

Appointed as Sonipat district president of Congress in August last year, Mr. Dewan said he stayed among the people since the last mayoral bypoll. He rejected claims by rivals that he lacked public support and said he was confident of a "resounding victory".

"Corruption in the municipal corporation is the major issue," Mr. Dewan said. He said the 'safai karamcharis' (sanitation workers) who had not been paid salaries for six months, and the fire brigade employees had

pledged support to him.

With the Hooda family seen as influential in the Sonipat-Rohtak-Jhajjar belt, Congress's Rohtak MP Deepender Hooda has completed a round of canvassing in the municipal corporation area, which encompasses four Assembly constituencies, including Gannaur, Rai and Kharkhoda. He is scheduled to address several more meetings before the polling.

The BJP has brought in north-east Delhi MP Manoj Tiwari to woo Purvanchali voters, who number around 15,000. Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini held meetings with voters across all 22 wards on Monday, and New Delhi MP Bansuri Swaraj is also expected to campaign for the party.

Punjabi factor

Mr. Jain played down the Hoodas' influence, pointing to the 2024 Assembly results. "Four of the six As-

sembly seats were won by the BJP and only one by the Congress. At least Sonipat is no more a Hooda bastion," said Mr. Jain, a former media adviser to then Chief Minister Manohar Lal from 2014-19.

Punjabis make up around 20% of the electorate in the municipal corporation area and hold the key to the election outcome, said realtor Praveen Arora.

"Though sewage and drinking water pipelines have been laid during the BJP rule, the prolonged delay in completing the work caused inconvenience to locals and made them angry," Mr. Arora said. "Rampant corruption" in getting routine work done has also gone against the regime, he said, but the Congress nominee lacked the social connect and experience of the BJP candidate. "All said and done, the election would be decided the way the Punjabis vote," Mr. Arora said.

AIADMK sticks to its stand of not extending support to TVK

Deputy gen. secy. Munusamy dismisses reports on the party's inclination to support new govt.; BJP reportedly keen on its ally throwing weight behind Vijay to keep Congress out of power; most AIADMK legislators housed in a resort in Puducherry, says senior leader

The AIADMK on Wednesday reiterated that it would not support the regime likely to be formed by the TVK.

Stating this after the party general secretary, Edappadi K. Palaniswami, held a meeting with newly-elected legislators and senior office-bearers, its deputy general secretary K.P. Munusamy, in a conversation with *The Hindu*, did not give any lengthy reason for the decision. "Ours is a big institution. This observation explains everything, doesn't it?" he said, dismissing reports of the party's inclination to support the TVK.

Notwithstanding his assertion, there were voices within the organisation that wanted to support the government of the fledgling party. On Tuesday, former Finance Minister C. Ponnaiyan told *The Hindu*: "We are an ally of the BJP. How does the question of my party supporting the TVK or taking support

from the TVK arise?"

Reconsideration tone

However, later in the day, the tone for the reconsideration of the party's stand was set by Leema Rose, the newly elected legislator from Lalgudi, who told the media that negotiations were under way between Mr. Palaniswami and the TVK over the formation of the government. When *The Hindu* tried contacting

her on Wednesday, she remained incommunicado. On Tuesday, there were also varying reports regarding a meeting between TVK general secretary 'Bussy' N. Anand and Mr. Palaniswami.

Since Wednesday morning, sections of the AIADMK have been spreading the word that a large chunk of MLAs-elect was rallying behind former Law Minister C.Ve. Shan-

mugam, who was elected from Mailam, for the purpose of sharing power in the government. Mr. Shanmugam, who was not accessible to this journalist despite repeated efforts, told reporters that it was for the party to take a call.

Some of the new legislators, including L. Jayasudha and former Ministers K.P. Anbalagan and N. Thilavai Sundaram, said when they all met the AIADMK general secretary on Tuesday to exchange pleasantries, there was neither a discussion on the party's stand vis-à-vis the likely TVK regime, nor any signature campaign favouring the organisation's support for the new government.

Mr. Shanmugam's political stock seems to have gone up in the wake of the party's abysmal performance in the western belt and moderate showing in the old North Arcot-South Arcot (NASA) region. The party, which secured 47 seats across the State, won 16 in the region. Mr. Shanmugam and his colleague, S.P. Velumani, held talks at the former's residence be-

fore meeting Mr. Palaniswami.

United against DMK

There are reports in sections of the media that the BJP is keen on the AIADMK supporting the TVK government to prevent any room for the Congress's support. However, some functionaries of the AIADMK feel that, as their party and the TVK are on the same page with regard to opposing the DMK, they should come together. Besides, as the Leader of the Opposition post has gone to the DMK, there is no point in trying to find relevance for the party to remain in the Opposition.

A senior leader of the party in the western region says the TVK's senior leader and former School Education Minister K.A. Sengottaiyan is in contact with some of the MLAs of the AIADMK, triggering talk that the party is heading towards a split.

Meanwhile, most AIADMK legislators were housed in a resort in Puducherry, according to a senior leader.

Decades-old DMK-Cong. relationship ends

The over two-decade-old relationship between the DMK and Congress, with a brief break during the 2014 Lok Sabha poll, has finally come to an end. Whenever the two parties engaged in tough bargaining over seat sharing - first in 2011, when the Congress insisted on being allotted 90 seats and eventually got over 60, and again in 2026, when negotiations reached a stage of brinkmanship - the alliance ended up losing elections.

Though together they shaped India's coalition politics and remained an antidote to the BJP and its ideology, the relationship was not free of tensions. In 2004, DMK leader M. Karunanidhi, demanding important portfolios for his party's Ministers, as agreed in the pre-poll arrangement, announced

they would not assume office until his demands were met. The Congress, then at the mercy of its allies, obliged. However, it stood firm in 2009 and retained the key portfolios.

The 2G spectrum issue further widened the divide between the two parties, and the DMK quit the Congress-led government before the 2014 Lok Sabha

poll. The parties, however, came together again in the 2016 Assembly poll.

What was expected to happen in the run-up to the 2016 election has now occurred after the 2026 election. "We were not able to find an appropriate reason to leave the alliance... we could not say no when [TVK leader] Vijay reached out to us [after the election]. It is the wish of the majority of party workers in the State," said a senior Congress leader. "They are celebrating the end of the alliance."

Irrespective of the outcome of the 2026 Assembly election, the DMK leadership had made up its mind to snap ties with the Congress after the bitter experience of seat-sharing negotiations. Party chief M.K. Stalin was reportedly upset that Congress leader

Rahul Gandhi, with whom he believed he shared a close bond, did not reach out during the negotiations. He also failed to share the dais during the campaign.

When a suggestion to send winning Congress candidates to meet Mr. Stalin and thank him was turned down, it became clear that the relationship had effectively ended.

Another Congress leader, however, questioned the logic of extending blanket support to Mr. Vijay and contesting alongside him in all future elections, including the Rajya Sabha polls.

"We may have differences with the DMK, but no leader in the country has opposed the BJP in the manner Mr. Stalin has. What will be the Congress's stand if Mr. Vijay does not show a similar commitment to opposing the BJP?" he said.

Cong. faced collateral damage in alliance: MP

Congress MP B. Manickam Tagore, who was among those in the party pushing for an alliance with the TVK before the Assembly election, on Wednesday said the people of the State had rejected the M.K. Stalin-led DMK.

In a social media post, he said the Tamil Nadu election results "have gone against the DMK".

The Virudhunagar MP ridiculed the Dravidian party, claiming that half of the DMK's Cabinet Ministers had lost their seats in the election. He also said the Congress had won only five out of the 28 seats it had contested as part of the DMK-led Secular Progressive Alliance (SPA), and claimed that the national party had faced collateral damage "for no fault of ours".

Claiming that the ruling BJP at the Centre was eyeing Tamil Nadu, Mr. Tagore said the question before the Congress was clear: "Should we stand with those rejected by the people's verdict, or should we unite with the force that fought against the BJP and will fight to stop the BJP from ruling Tamil Nadu?"

Karnataka BJP leader takes oath as MLA after recount

Karnataka BJP leader D.N. Jeevaraj was sworn in as MLA on Wednesday, following a recount held three years after the Assembly election.

Assembly Speaker U.T. Khader administered the oath of office to him. Mr. Jeevaraj had lost to Congress' T.D. Raje Gowda in the 2023 election from the Sringeri Assembly constituency. Following a recount of postal ballots polled in 2023, as directed by the High Court of Karnataka, he was declared elected from the seat, setting off a controversy.

The Congress accused the BJP of a "criminal conspiracy" and asked how 255 valid votes polled in favour of Mr. Gowda were declared invalid in the recount. The BJP earlier accused Mr. Khader of "intentionally" delaying the oath-taking of Mr. Jeevaraj. Mr. Khader denied the allegations.

Kerala CPI(M) to take feedback on poll rout from all party members

It will provide platform to cadres at all levels to voice their criticism 'fearlessly'; State secretary admits to organisational issues and says party will corrective steps to win back people's trust; CPI members criticise Pinarayi's style of functioning

Jolted by one of the biggest defeats in its electoral history, the CPI(M) in Kerala has decided to hold meetings at all levels to allow party members to voice their criticism and opinions "fearlessly."

After a meeting of the party's State secretariat here on Wednesday, CPI (M) State secretary M.V. Govindan told mediapersons that the State leadership will conduct a review and take corrective measures to win back the confidence of the people.

The decision to provide a platform for party mem-

bers down to the branch committee level to express their opinion comes in the wake of the crushing defeat of the party even in

some of its strongholds in Kannur.

assessment of the causes of the defeat. A detailed analysis will be done at all levels of the party.

"The party understands that there have been organisational and political issues as well as negative propaganda against the party, which contributed to the defeat. The Left has a history of learning from setbacks and taking corrective steps to make a comeback. We will make an honest assessment," he said.

Review meetings

It will hold meetings of party committees at various levels. "All the comrades across all levels will have the opportunity to raise is-

issues freely and fearlessly. The party's election review will be prepared based on the discussions in these meetings, instead of the State secretariat preparing a review and passing it to lower levels," said Mr. Govindan.

The CPI too will hold meetings in all districts to assess the party's performance. At a party meeting on Wednesday, members criticised the style of functioning of outgoing Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan. "Changes will be made wherever it is needed. What needs to be corrected will be corrected," party State secretary Binoy Viswam said.

NC, PDP clash over poll setback, Urdu and school closure

Ruling National Conference (NC) and Opposition Peoples Democratic Party (PDP) on Wednesday traded barbs over the Rajya Sabha polls and the closure of a seminary-cum-school and "sidelining" Urdu in Kashmir.

Speaking in north Kashmir's Tangmarg, where he inaugurated a multipurpose sports complex at Government Degree College, J&K Chief Minister Omar Abdullah said, "Those who aided the BJP in the Rajya Sabha polls were exposed through Right to Information (RTI). No one in my party will act against the organisation."

J&K held three rounds of polling for four Rajya Sabha seats in October 2025. According to Election Commission data, the third round recorded the highest number of invalid votes, three out of 87 cast. In the third round, won by the BJP, the NC lost seven votes, including four cross-votes and three invalid ballots.

'Diversion tactic'

According to an RTI, the PDP, which had three votes, had not appointed polling agents despite publicly backing the NC. The NC has now cast aspersions on PDP's voting pattern.

The PDP, however, dismissed the claim and accused the rival party of us-

ing the issue as a "diversion tactic". "This is not fundamentally about the Rajya Sabha - it serves as a distraction from substantive concerns, notably the Siraj-ul-Uloom controversy and the erasure of Urdu from official records," said PDP legislator Waheed-ur-Rehman Parra.

Accusing the NC of weakening the People's Alliance for Gupkar Declaration, Mr. Parra said the PDP owed no obligation to support the NC but still extended unconditional backing despite being aware of dissent within the ruling party. "Blaming the PDP for the Rajya Sabha outcome is both inaccurate and counterproductive," he said.

PDP president Mehbooba Mufti accused the NC of dragging religious issues into political rivalry. "I wish NC leaders had spoken up when the Waqf Bill was passed or when Siraj-ul-Uloom school was closed," she said.

Sabarimala review: SC questions validity of pleas against 1962 order

The Supreme Court on Wednesday questioned the maintainability of public interest litigation (PIL) or writ petitions challenging the authority of the Dawoodi Bohra community leaders to excommunicate their members.

In 2023, the court had referred to a nine-judge Bench for an authoritative

pronouncement on whether the practice of excommunication in the Dawoodi Bohra community could continue as a "protected practice" despite the coming into force of the Maharashtra Protection of People from Social Boycott (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act of 2016.

The reference to the Dawoodi Bohra was later tagged with the Sabarimala case.

On Wednesday, Justice B.V. Nagarathna, a member of the nine-judge Bench headed by Chief Justice of India Surya Kant, asked senior advocate Raju Ramachandran, appearing for the writ petitioners, if a Constitution Bench judgment, that too one which had held the fort for over 60 years, could be challenged through PILs, however "reformist" they may intend to be.

4 farmers die in shed collapse in Telangana

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Cost of success

The BJP's path to victory in Assam undermined the health of India's polity

Himanta Biswa Sarma is expected to take oath as Chief Minister after leading the BJP to power in Assam yet again. Mr. Sarma was a Congress leader when the party came to power in the north-eastern State in 2011, but switching sides in 2015, he became the central figure of the BJP not only in Assam but also in States around it. Starting in 2001 on a Congress ticket, he has won six consecutive elections from the same Assembly seat. Having emerged as a very powerful leader, he joined the BJP, and was appointed Chief Minister in 2021. Since then, he has reshaped the politics of the State through exceptional organisational ability, communal rhetoric, and the partisan use of state power. An infrastructure push combined with welfare delivery – the Orunodoi scheme of direct cash transfer to women and Mission Basundhara, a flagship initiative to streamline and digitise land records and protect land rights – not only enabled the BJP's deep expansion, but along with other measures, including the delimitation of Assembly constituencies in 2023, reshaped the State's political landscape. Mr. Sarma has been both the creator and the principal beneficiary of this process.

The BJP's victory in Assam has significant implications for power dynamics within the party nationally. Mr. Sarma is perceived to be close to Union Home Minister Amit Shah. The BJP alone commands a majority in the 126-strong Assembly, and the ruling coalition has 102 members. The BJP has not only decimated the Opposition but also rendered regional parties inconsequential. It has consolidated a spectrum of fragmented social groups and diluted the linguistic and ethnic politics of the State. But in doing so, it has sharply polarised Assam along religious lines. The delimitation carved out constituencies by packing and cracking communities in ways that suppress Muslim representation, with the BJP and the Congress now mirroring a Hindu-Muslim binary in the newly elected Assembly. Eviction drives have disproportionately targeted Bengali-speaking Muslim communities; 40,000 individuals were displaced in 2025 alone, officially framed as anti-encroachment action but widely seen as selective targeting. Assam is a sensitive border region, and the BJP's approach to its governance needs to be commensurately sensitive. All parties have a legitimate right to consolidate themselves and win elections. But that must be done with the utmost attention to the long-term health of the polity and the interests of the country as a whole. At this moment of triumph, the BJP in Assam would do well to reflect on the costs of the victory that it has just secured.

Back in the saddle

Congress leaders in Kerala should rise above personal ambitions

Riding a massive anti-incumbency wave, the Congress-led United Democratic Front (UDF) returned to power in the Kerala Assembly on May 4, ending 10 years of its being in the political wilderness. After an unprecedented defeat in 2021, the alliance worked systematically for a comeback, winning four by-elections, the general election in 2024 and the civic-body polls last year before storming back into the State Assembly through deft electioneering and collective effort that sought to capitalise on surging resentment against the functioning of the Left Democratic Front (LDF) government led by CPI(M) leader Pinarayi Vijayan. The BJP reopened its account, securing three seats, finishing second in six and clinching a substantial share of votes in pockets in north, central and south Kerala, redrawing the electoral landscape. Its low vote share notwithstanding, the party is doubtless growing, albeit incrementally. To be fair to the Left, which received a debilitating blow, the outgoing government embarked on a path of growth, filling infrastructure gaps, soliciting private investment and pursuing sustainable industries without forgoing its Leftist thrust on welfare and public governance, despite facing fiscal embargoes and pocket veto by inimical Governors. While Left supporters acquiesced in its political economy, many could not digest the lack of accountability and the overbearing, if not dismissive, demeanour of the CPI(M)'s senior leadership. The Left tried to claim what was seen as an emerging Hindu vote base through events such as the Global Ayyappa Devotees' Meet, even while selectively targeting the Indian Union Muslim League (IUML) for presumably being in concert with the forces of political Islam. The IUML employed everything in its armour to hand a crushing defeat to the Left, not just in Malappuram, its stronghold, but also in other parts of the State. Rebellion broke out in the rank and file of the Left ahead of the elections over issues of nepotism and the concentration of power in a single person bestowed with a cult status, which the UDF leveraged. It led to the fall of some decades-old Left citadels, with a cascading effect elsewhere as well.

Back in the saddle, the immediate task before the Congress and the UDF will be to stay true to their slogan of being a team and finalise a cabinet with a popular and efficient leader. A historic mandate of 102 seats, also counting the independents it backed, should inspire the alliance to form a government that is accessible, competent and grounded. The period between polling and counting saw senior Congress leaders draw public ridicule for an unabashed display of a lust for the chief ministerial post, to the dismay of the party high command and the allies. Democracy would be better served if the Congress acted responsibly, with the leaders setting aside personal ambitions for the larger good.

Understanding inequality in India's growth story

There have been some significant policy changes in the recent past – this includes the implementation of the new Labour Codes and the Viksit Bharat-Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeevika Mission (Gramin) Bill, 2025 replacing the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) – which have raised serious concerns regarding the welfare of informal workers and those belonging to rural India. These changes are accompanied by the official understanding that inequality is much less of a concern today than it was in the early 2010s, even though data comparability itself is an issue.

Inequality estimates, initial observations
Analysis of inequality warrants clarification on a few issues, among other things.

The first is inequality of what – income, wealth, consumption expenditure? Second, how is it measured? Third, along which axis it is assessed – caste, class, gender, religion?, and fourth, data source and comparability of estimates generated from multiple surveys, if



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marked with methodological changes. Our estimate from the Household Consumer Expenditure Survey (HCES 2023-24), conducted by the National Sample Survey Organisation (NSSO), suggests that overall consumption expenditure inequality, measured by the Gini index, is 0.29 – higher than the widely cited World Bank estimate of 0.25. The World Bank's method too, in this regard, came under scrutiny. With further disaggregation, one finds that urban, as expected, is more unequal than the rural sector. India's consumption boom during the last couple of decades has been primarily driven by non-food expenditure. We find that inequality is much higher for the same compared to food expenditure. This is true for the rural and urban sectors, the inequality for both being higher in case of the urban sectors, and relatively more for non-food expenditure.

Since most growth-inducing activities are urban-centric and agricultural distress persists, it is imperative to examine the urban-rural gap, which is shown by the mean ratio here. A higher than unity mean ratio would reflect a relatively better position than the respective all-India average. Lesser than unity would imply otherwise. There is a substantial gap between urban and rural sectors in this regard and the disparity is more striking in the case of non-food expenditure. For example, average urban non-food monthly per capita expenditure (MPCE) is about 1.5 times higher than the all-India average, while that for rural is much lower than the same point of reference.

Our disaggregated analysis also reveals a considerable gap between the consumption share and per-capita spending of overall MPCE-based deciles. In the urban sector, the top 10% of the population alone contributes 27% of the total non-food expenditure, implying that the rest of the 90% contributes only 73% of the same. The mean MPCE of the topmost decile is six times that of the bottom most decile for the urban sector, compared to 4.5 times in the rural sector. Strikingly, the mean MPCE of the top most decile in the urban sector is nine times that of the bottom most decile in the rural sector. Once we proceed a step further and decompose total inequality into within- and between-group components, it appears that: in urban India, within-decile and between-decile inequalities account for about 33% and 67% of food expenditure inequality, respectively, and about 10% and 90% of non-food expenditure inequality. The relative importance of between-decile group

inequality for non-food consumption holds true for the rural sector too. Further, the per-capita consumption expenditure of the richest 5% is six times higher than that of the poorest 5% in the rural areas; the same is nine times for urban areas. In short, the urban sector, which is more affluent, is more unequal than its rural counterparts.

Inequality dynamics in India

First, it is almost unanimously agreed upon that the superrich segment of the Indian population is hardly captured by the NSS surveys (consumption or wealth); thus any inequality estimation based on the same is a gross underestimation. Our own calculation based on this data suggests that about one fourth of even the richest 10% in India benefited from the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Yojana (PMKAY) and about 13% of them have access to Below Poverty Line (BPL) ration cards.

Second, for a nuanced understanding of inequality dynamics in India, one must go beyond inter-personal or solely income/spending groups-based (for example, decile; percentile) inequality calculations and analyse disparity along various socio-economic axes such as caste and class. Deploying an alternative class-based analysis alongside a closer examination of the growth process and policy changes since Independence, Vamsi Vakulabharanam of the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, in his book, *Class and Inequality in China and India, 1950-2010*, shows that since the 1980s (even before the 1991 reforms), urban owners, managers, and professionals have gained disproportionately, contributing to India's consumption boom.

In contrast, urban informal workers, rural small farmers, and agricultural labourers have lagged markedly behind. All these added to increasing between-class inequality *vis-à-vis* within-class inequality in India's evolving urban landscape. Over the last decade or so, there has not been any systemic change despite various welfare measures, to counter or reverse such trend in class-based inequality. Typical explorations of inequality often overlook this growth-class-inequality nexus. Moreover, a large share of Indians remains engaged in debt-led consumption. The complexities involved in the issue of inequality in India warn us that policies formulated on the presupposition of lower disparity could be misleading and may produce adverse, albeit unintended, welfare implications.

Locating inequality by space and consumption type

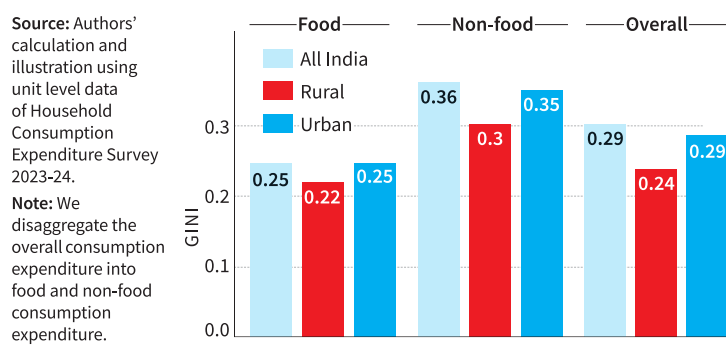
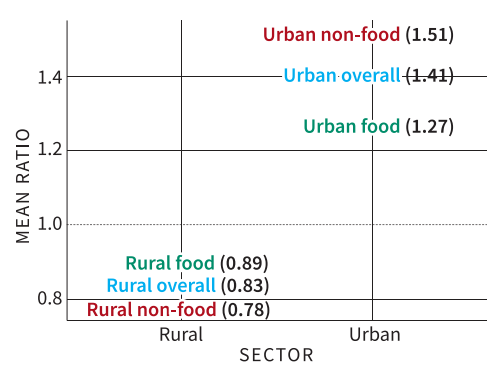


Figure 2: Urban – rural gap by consumption type

Fixing structural deficits in India's health system

On March 11, 2026, the Minister of State for Health, Anupriya Patel, informed Parliament that 43 new medical colleges have been established and 11,682 MBBS seats along with 8,967 postgraduate seats have been approved for the 2025-26 academic year.

Will this address India's problem of non-availability of doctors in the public health system? Of the 8,967 new postgraduate doctors, how many will actually have the inclination to serve in aspirational districts or underserved areas? Of the 43 newly sanctioned medical colleges, only eight are under State governments, eight are in the Employees' State Insurance (ESI) sector, and 27 are in the private sector. Private medical colleges, after charging high capitation fees, have no obligation to post their trainees in government service, nor can they be compelled to do so. There is also no clearly defined policy or stipulations to ensure that public health institutions benefit maximally by filling existing vacancies in specialist cadre posts.

Merely investing in capital expenditure and infrastructure alone will not yield the desired improvement in health services in hilly, tribal, and other remote underserved areas. Eleven out of 18 All India Institutes of Medical Sciences report around 40% vacancies in their teaching and research faculty positions. Without adequate research and teaching capacity, how can we effectively train specialists?

Glaring vacancy rate

According to The Health Dynamics of India 2022-23 report, the vacancy rate in 5,491 rural Community Health Centres (CHC) across 757 districts in India is 79.9%, with only 4,413 specialists available against a requirement of 21,964. Since 2014, the shortfall of specialists in CHCs has remained at around 17,500, despite the creation of additional postgraduate medical seats – 72,627 across 731 medical colleges.

Newly graduated specialists are often unwilling to work in remote and underserved areas due to inadequate facilities, including lack of equipment, decent staff quarters, schools for their children,

and adequate peer medical support. If specialists were available at CHCs, patients from rural and tribal areas would not need to travel long distances to district headquarters hospitals or medical colleges.

A CHC serves as a first referral unit for a population of about 1.6 lakh to 2 lakh and is expected to have 30 beds with five specialists – physician, surgeon, obstetrician, paediatrician, and anaesthetist. However, the majority of CHCs remain crippled due to a persistent shortage of specialists, a problem that has continued for many years.

Yet, States continue to construct more CHCs to utilise available central government funds, even though many of them function effectively as primary health centres. There are 5,491 CHCs across 785 districts – about seven CHCs per district – which is not a feasible model. With only 4,413 specialists available at present, just 882 CHCs can be fully operationalised, effectively leaving only one functional CHC per district in addition to the district hospital for specialised care.

Flawed budgetary focus

The central health Budget is largely focused on infrastructure, without matching allocations for drugs, diagnostics, ambulance services, emergency care, or salaries for temporary staff. If the goal is to improve people's health, it must prioritise operational outcomes rather than merely investing capital in building construction, leaving the rest to be managed by State budgets.

How do we manage better with what we have in hand? We need to put the brakes on overly enthusiastic declarations of new CHCs, which often serve populist political mileage rather than functional need.

Classify all PHCs and CHCs into normal, difficult, and most difficult areas based on defined criteria, as was done in Chhattisgarh under the Rural Medical Corps Scheme. The most difficult areas are those with persistently high staff vacancies over long periods. Introduce special incentives such as additional

compensatory financial allowances, priority for postgraduate seats, staff quarters, and quality schooling facilities for children, among others.

Additional steps to take

Hereafter, all government-sponsored postgraduate seat allocations must be linked to existing vacancies in CHCs or district hospitals. Candidates willing to fill a specialist vacancy in a CHC should be allotted a seat in the corresponding speciality, with the assurance that upon completion of training, they will be posted there immediately.

Conversely, aspirant doctors must provide an undertaking to serve in the designated government facility first. Priority may be given to those who commit to a 10-year service bond in difficult-area CHCs, along with additional incentives under the National Health Mission. We must strictly follow an "all or none" principle in posting specialists – either all five specialists are placed in a CHC or none at all – avoiding piecemeal deployment or the dilution of services by spreading specialists too thinly.

Urgent construction of staff quarters and renovation of operation theatres, labour rooms, intensive care units, and 24-hour emergency units must be undertaken in such CHCs, which may number two or three per district. Similar undertakings and post graduate training can be awarded to nurses willing to serve in remote needy areas.

When adequate specialists are posted as a team at the sub-district or town level, the image of government hospitals improves in the public eye. The workload is better distributed, and optimal sharing reduces stress on doctors on duty. Interpersonal communication with patients also improves. This, in turn, enhances patient satisfaction and reduces conflicts between the public and doctors and other health staff.

We can no longer afford to see nearly 70,000 specialists graduating from 731 medical colleges without adequately filling the vacant posts in the public health system, which remains the only source of care for the poor and marginalised.

A new roadmap for independent cinema

The latest rule changes by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences are not merely procedural – they signal a philosophical shift in how global cinema is seen, validated, and circulated. By loosening the “one country, one film” submission rule for the International Feature category, and allowing festival-acclaimed films to qualify independently, the Academy Awards are attempting to dismantle one of the most enduring bottlenecks in world cinema. For India, this is not just an administrative tweak – it is a structural opening, especially for its vibrant but sidelined independent film ecosystem.

For decades, India's Oscar journey has been shaped as much by internal gatekeeping as by external perception. The country's official entry – decided by committees – has often sparked debate, with selections that leaned toward middle-of-the-road narratives rather than daring or politically nuanced cinema. This has meant that some of India's most globally resonant films never even entered the Oscar race.

No dearth of candidates

Consider *The Lunchbox*. Directed by Ritesh Batra, the film premiered at Cannes Critics' Week; garnered universal acclaim; and travelled widely across international festivals. Its delicate storytelling, anchored in loneliness and urban alienation, spoke a cinematic language that global audiences immediately embraced. Yet, it was not selected as India's official Oscar entry. Under the new rules, a film like *The Lunchbox* could have bypassed national selection and entered the Oscars directly.

Similarly, *Court* by Chaitanya Tamhane, which is a deep political examination of India's judicial system, won the Orizzonti Award at Venice and multiple international honours. While it was India's official entry, it lacked the sustained campaign

infrastructure to penetrate the Oscar shortlist. Under a system that values festival recognition more directly, such films gain not just eligibility but also legitimacy.

Or take *Masaan*, directed by Neeraj Ghaywan. Premiering in the 'Un Certain Regard' section at Cannes and winning two awards, *Masaan* bridged the spaces of the intimate and the universal with remarkable ease. Its exploration of caste, grief, and aspiration in small-town India resonated far beyond its geography. Yet, it never became India's Oscar entry. In the new framework, its festival success alone could have propelled it into the awards race.

Even more telling are films such as *Village Rockstars* by Rima Das. A deeply personal, almost handmade film set in rural Assam, it won the National Award and travelled internationally, embodying a kind of authenticity that the global film community increasingly values. While it was India's official submission, its lack of campaign backing limited its reach. A festival-driven qualification system could amplify such voices, allowing them to compete on artistic merit rather than industrial muscle.

Lack of representation

Indian independent cinema has long been globally visible but institutionally underrepresented. The new Oscar guidelines disrupt this pattern by shifting the axis of validation from national committees to international circuits. This is particularly significant in a country like India, where cinema operates across multiple languages, regions, and aesthetic traditions. The idea that a single film can “represent” such diversity has always been flawed. By allowing multiple entry points, the Academy is acknowledging that cinema is not a monolith but a mosaic. However, this expanded access also introduces new complexities. Festival success, while crucial, is not a guarantee of Oscar traction. The Academy's ecosystem still relies heavily on

visibility, campaigning, and industry networks. Films such as *All We Imagine as Light* by Payal Kapadia demonstrate how crucial sustained global engagement is. Under the new rules, such films are better positioned, but they still require strategic backing to convert acclaim into nominations.

Yet, the broader implication of these changes lies in how they reshape cinematic aspiration. For Indian filmmakers, especially those outside the mainstream industry, the Oscars are no longer a distant, opaque institution mediated by national selection. They become a more accessible platform – one that rewards global dialogue over domestic endorsement. This could catalyse a shift in how films are conceived, produced, and circulated. One may see greater emphasis on international co-productions, festival strategies, and cross-cultural storytelling. At the same time, there is a risk of homogenisation – of films tailoring themselves to perceived “festival tastes” at the expense of local specificity.

But the history of cinema suggests otherwise. The most globally successful films are often those most deeply rooted in their own contexts. Bong Joon-ho's *Parasite* did not dilute its Korean identity to achieve global success. The lesson for Indian cinema is clear: authenticity travels.

The road ahead

Ultimately, the new Oscar guidelines acknowledge that cinema today is transnational – not because it erases borders, but because it speaks across them.

For Indian independent cinema, this is a moment of possibility. The challenge lies in building the ecosystems that can support this transition: better international distribution, and robust campaign infrastructures. If that happens, the impact could be profound. Not just in terms of awards, but in how Indian stories are positioned within the global cinematic imagination.

The rise of an apolitical polity

TVK's victory points to the importance of alternative modes of outreach

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Even though Tamil Nadu's outgoing Chief Minister M. K. Stalin put on a brave face and said he would face both defeat and success with equanimity, his loss in the Kolathur constituency appears to have shaken him. As the leader of the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK), he campaigned across the State for his party, and had been confident that his own constituency was secure, having nurtured it like no other. He will go down in history as the fourth sitting Chief Minister of Tamil Nadu who has lost an election.

Constituencies represented by a Chief Minister typically attain VIP status by default. Kolathur, however, became Mr. Stalin's second home, as he made it a point to visit almost every week. The constituency saw the development of hospitals, schools, flyovers, playgrounds, and colleges, among other facilities.

Yet voters chose the candidate of the fledgling Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK), V. S. Babu, a former DMK leader and district secretary. Observers point to a shift in voting patterns among certain communities in the constituency, including Christians and Scheduled Castes, some of whom appeared to favour actor C. Joseph Vijay's TVK.

Shift among Christians

This trend was not confined to Kolathur. In several constituencies across the State with a significant Christian population – traditionally seen as supportive of the DMK due to its strong anti-Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) stance – there ap-

peared to be a shift in preferences. The decline in vote share for the DMK and its allies in districts such as Kanniyakumari, which has a substantial Christian population, suggests the alliance may have lost ground among these voters. In Killiyur, Congress candidate Rajesh Kumar, who had won by a margin of over 50,000 votes in 2021, saw his victory margin shrink to just over 1,000 votes this time. Other constituencies in the district witnessed a similar trend. A comparable pattern appeared in Kolathur, where some voters seemed to favour Mr. Vijay over Mr. Stalin, despite the Chief Minister's continued engagement with the community, including organising annual Christmas events and extending financial support to certain churches.

Some voters framed their preferences in identity terms, expressing a desire for greater representation in leadership.

Apolitical Gen-Z

Beyond Kolathur, the DMK appeared to be struggling to connect with sections of ‘Generation Z’ or Gen-Z, whose political engagement tends to be more fluid and less tied to established party structures. Historically, the Dravidian movement has drawn significant strength from student mobilisation. In contrast, campus politics today appears far more subdued. Student unions are absent in many col-

leges, and even where they exist, they are often largely apolitical in character. The proliferation of engineering and professional colleges, along with a shift away from the humanities, has further contributed to the weakening of political engagement among students. For many students, the primary focus is on securing employment through campus placements, leaving limited space for sustained political involvement. The DMK leadership appears to be continuing to rely on an older political idiom, rooted in the rhetoric of the 1950s and 1960s, and often centred on emotive appeals, which may have limited resonance in today's social media-driven campaign environment.

In contrast, Mr. Vijay's campaign suggests that electoral success can, at least in certain contexts, be achieved without a deeply entrenched organisational structure or continuous engagement through traditional media, large-scale conferences, or expensive campaign spending. His approach points to the growing importance of alternative modes of outreach, particularly those that connect more directly with younger and digitally engaged voters. In many constituencies, voters did not know the candidates of Mr. Vijay's party. They voted for him and his symbol, the ‘Whistle’.

Mr. Vijay's victory has put an end to the bipolar politics of Tamil Nadu, hitherto dominated by the two Dravidian parties. The shift towards a three-cornered contest has created space for smaller parties as well as a party like the BJP, which has been making sustained efforts to establish a foothold. The TVK's emergence may realign Tamil Nadu's political equations more broadly.

TVK makes inroads into AIADMK's core voter base in T.N.

Historical floors show the DMK losing less of its core support and more of its floating votes

The Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam (TVK), which sprung a surprise in the 2026 Assembly elections, has not only altered the bipolar nature of Tamil Nadu's politics for the first time since 1977, but has also raised questions over the future of the two Dravidian majors – the Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (DMK) and the All India Anna Dravida Munnetra Kazhagam (AIADMK).

However, analysis of region-wise variations in the vote shares secured by the TVK, the DMK and the AIADMK in the 134 constituencies they directly faced each other showed that the electoral outcome has become an existential threat for the AIADMK, which seems to have lost its core vote bank to the TVK. In contrast, the DMK has largely retained its core vote bank.

In three of the five regions – Greater Chennai, central and south – the vote share secured by the AIADMK in the seats it contested is the lowest in 2026. For the DMK, the vote share secured in 2026 was its lowest ever only in the Greater Chennai region (Table 1).

A closer analysis also showed that there was a strong negative correlation between the vote shares secured by the AIADMK and the TVK in almost all of these 134 constituencies (Table 2). This means that wherever the AIADMK's vote share dropped, the TVK's vote share went up. This was more pronounced in the constituencies in the central and south regions (Chart 1).

This negative correlation between the AIADMK and the TVK was robust across all regions, except the West, which had been a stronghold of the former in the past few decades.

In comparison, such a correlation was not observed between the

TVK and the DMK, except in the Greater Chennai region where the TVK swept the polls by hurting both the Dravidian parties. In fact, in the north, central and west regions, both the DMK and the TVK had a positive correlation, which means wherever the TVK had good vote shares or lower ones, the DMK had the same as well.

Curiously, if the AIADMK had lost a chunk of structural or core support to the TVK, then the DMK should have emerged victorious overall, thanks to the split in the anti-incumbency votes. But that did not happen. The reason is visible in another set of data: the change in vote shares since 2021. Table 3 shows the swing in those same 134 seats.

In most regions, the DMK lost a higher share of votes than the AIADMK – except in the west and the south. And overall, across these 134 seats, the DMK's vote share dropped by 13.9 percentage points against the AIADMK's 12.0.

This seeming contradiction where the AIADMK is hitting its lowest floors while the DMK is witnessing a larger overall swing compared to 2021, is best explained by the kinds of voters each party lost. The DMK shed a bigger pool of floating/swing voters to the TVK, either due to anti-incumbency or a clear preference for a new filmstar-led party that promised change. These losses were broadly uniform across constituencies, which is why they show up as a large swing but do not correlate with the TVK's seat-by-seat strength. The AIADMK lost a smaller share of votes overall because it had a lower vote share than the DMK to begin with in 2021. But a larger fraction of what it lost was core support.

In a party system, where the AIADMK's political identity rests on it being the anti-DMK pole, the TVK's inroads into the “Two leaves” base poses a serious threat to the party founded by former Chief Minister M.G. Ramachandran.

Breaching the AIADMK firewall

Only 134 constituencies in which the DMK, the AIADMK and the TVK directly contested against each other in 2026 were considered so that patterns measure transfers between these parties alone and controls for coalition effect

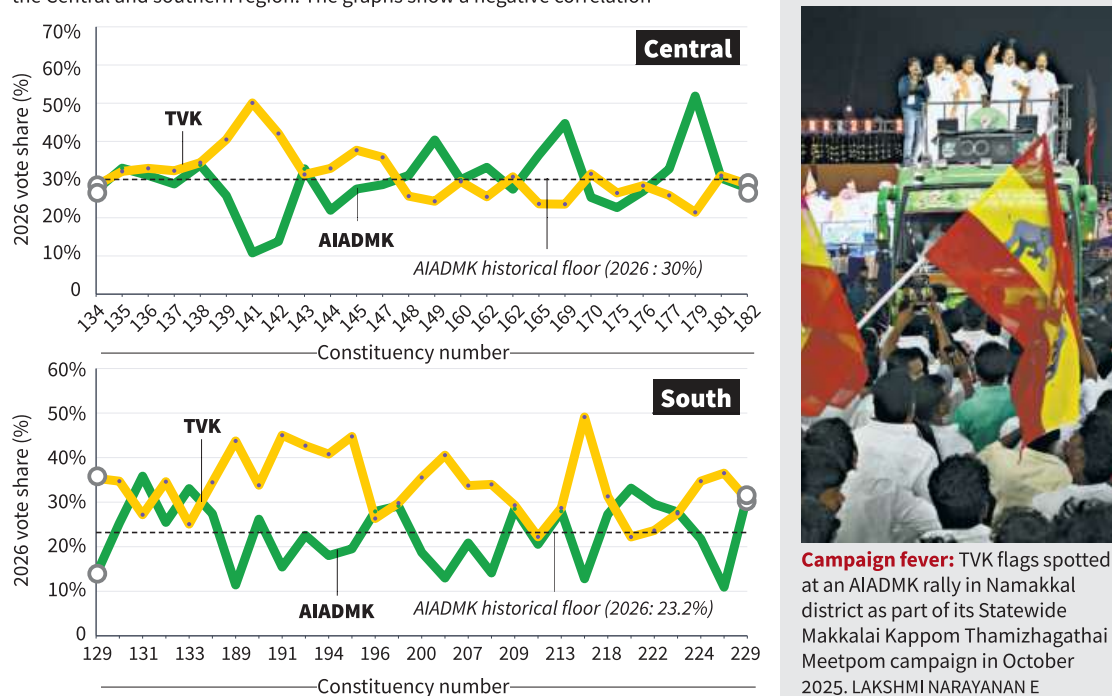

FIFTY YEARS AGO MAY 7, 1976

Better coffee yields with honey bees

A special experiment conducted by the bee-keeping wing of the Khadi and Village Industries Board in collaboration with the Central Bee Research Institute, Poona, during the blossoming of the coffee plants in Yercaud last month has proved to be a success.

During the one-week period of the experiment when coffee plants were in full blossom it was found that the honey production doubled. In 12 bee-hives kept at selected places, it was found that the average yield from each box was 3 kg as against about 4 kg during normal times.

Special steps were taken to enclose a portion of the coffee plants completely secure from pollination by bees or other natural agents ensuring only self-pollination; in another section coffee plants were allowed to be pollinated by all natural agents including bees, and in the last section coffee plants were surrounded by bee-hives so as to ensure maximum pollination by bees.

The Coffee Research Department is also taking follow-up action to find out the quality and quantity of coffee seeds that would be available from each of these sections after about nine months.

A HUNDRED YEARS AGO MAY 7, 1926

Plague's heavy toll in the Punjab

Simla, May 5: Plague has now assumed alarming proportions in the Punjab. During the week ending 10th April, there were no less than 7,236 cases and deaths stood at 5,379.

Practically every district in the Punjab has some area affected by plague with the exception of Simla, Kangra, Shahpur, Jhelum, Jhang, Multan and Muzaffargarh. The largest number of cases and deaths are reported from the Eastern districts.

Practically all the districts also report stray cases of small-pox. During the week, 365 cases of small pox occurred and 120 were deaths therefrom.

Balaspuri States are reported to be free from infection. The Health Department, Punjab is organising a campaign for meeting this situation.

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When does a CM cease to hold office?

Can a Governor remove a Chief Minister? What does 'pleasure of the Governor' mean? When is a floor test required? What happens after the Assembly's tenure ends? Can election results be challenged in court?

EXPLAINER

The story so far:

A day after the Trinamool Congress lost the West Bengal elections to the BJP, party chairperson Mamata Banerjee on May 5 said she would not resign as Chief Minister, alleging that the verdict was the result of a "conspiracy" rather than the people's mandate. Addressing a press conference, Ms. Banerjee claimed the elections had not been conducted fairly and accused the BJP of misusing central forces to "forcibly capture" booths and influence the outcome. She added that the party would challenge the results and continue its political fight.

Can a Governor remove a CM?

Article 164(I) of the Constitution provides that "the Chief Minister shall be appointed by the Governor and the other Ministers shall be appointed by the Governor on the advice of the Chief Minister, and the Ministers shall hold office during the pleasure of the Governor." On a literal reading of the provision, therefore, the Governor appears to possess the authority to remove a CM from office. However, members of the Constituent Assembly had cautioned that such a provision could potentially lend itself to an arbitrary exercise of gubernatorial discretion.

Constituent Assembly member Mohammad Ismail Khan had moved an amendment to the provision (then Article 144 of the Draft Constitution) proposing that the phrase "during the pleasure" be replaced with the words "so long as they enjoy the confidence of the Legislative Assembly of the State." He contended that once the constitutional scheme envisaged the Governor as a nominee of the

President, the Constitution ought to have made it explicit that the Council of Ministers would hold office not at the Governor's pleasure, but only so long as it continued to enjoy the confidence of the Legislative Assembly.

Addressing this concern, Dr. B. R. Ambedkar, Chairman of the Drafting Committee of the Constitution, affirmed that the Council of Ministers shall hold office only so long as it enjoys the confidence of the majority. "The reason why we have not so expressly stated it," he explained, "is because it has not been stated in that fashion or in those terms in any of the Constitutions which lay down a parliamentary system of government."

Over the years, the Supreme Court has also interpreted the Governor's powers as flowing primarily from the "aid and advice" of the Council of Ministers. In *A.G. Perarivalan v. State Through Superintendent of Police (2022)*, the apex court observed that the "Governor" is "but a shorthand expression for the State government". While recognising the Governor as "the formal head and sole

repository of the executive power", the court held that the office is ordinarily bound by the aid and advice of the State's Council of Ministers.

When is a floor test required?

If a Governor asks a Chief Minister to step down and invites another candidate for the post while the tenure of the Legislative Assembly is still on, there has to be a floor test – a constitutional mechanism used to determine whether the executive enjoys the confidence of the legislature. Under this process, the Chief Minister must prove majority support in the House. Failure to do so requires the CM to resign.

If no party or coalition can form a stable government, President's Rule under Article 356 may be imposed as a measure of last resort.

What happens after the Assembly's tenure ends?

Article 172 of the Constitution deals with the duration of a State Legislative Assembly and stipulates that, "unless

sooner dissolved", an Assembly "shall continue for five years from the date appointed for its first meeting and no longer, and the expiration of the said period of five years shall operate as a dissolution of the Assembly."

According to the Election Commission, the current West Bengal Assembly commenced its term on May 8, 2021, and is set to expire on May 7. Thereafter, the Governor will have to initiate the process for constituting a new Assembly.

What happens next?

According to former Lok Sabha Secretary-General P.D.T. Achary, a formal resignation following defeat in an Assembly election is largely a matter of convention. "Even if Ms. Banerjee does not resign, it would make no material difference. The tenure of the present Assembly ends on May 7, and with its dissolution, she will automatically cease to hold office as Chief Minister," he said.

He, however, pointed out that an election petition may be filed before the Calcutta High Court within 45 days from the declaration of the results of the concerned candidate. Section 100 of the Representation of the People Act, 1951 enumerates the grounds on which the election of a candidate may be challenged and declared void, including corrupt practices by the candidate and non-compliance with statutory provisions by the returning officer, among other grounds. He noted that a writ petition may be maintainable where the challenge concerns the integrity of the electoral process itself, including allegations of arbitrary voter deletions during the special intensive revision of electoral rolls in West Bengal.

"Large-scale deletion of voters in an election constitutes a violation of fundamental rights and can therefore be challenged through a writ petition," he said.

THE GIST

Though Article 164 states that the Council of Ministers holds office "during the pleasure of the Governor", this is not absolute; in practice, a Chief Minister can continue only so long as they enjoy the confidence of the Legislative Assembly.

The majority of a Chief Minister is determined through a floor test in the House, and if they fail to prove support, they must resign.

What is Karnataka's new gig worker grievance system?

What gap does Karnataka's new system address? How will the welfare fee be used?

The story so far:

On May 1, 2026 – International Workers' Day – the Karnataka government announced the operationalisation of a specialised grievance redressal mechanism for platform-based gig workers in the State. Claimed to be the first government-backed grievance handling mechanism for gig workers in India, it allows workers to officially lodge complaints through the Integrated Public Grievance Redressal System (IPGRS), the State's centralised digital platform for addressing citizen grievances related to government schemes.

How does the system work?

Platform-based gig workers can now officially lodge grievances, including those related to pay, working conditions, and platform-specific disputes, via the IPGRS.

Under the Karnataka Platform-Based Gig Workers (Social Security and Welfare) Act, every aggregator platform must constitute an Internal Dispute Resolution Committee (IDRC). Grievances filed on

the IPGRS will be automatically routed to the respective platform's IDRC. Upon receiving a complaint, the IDRC is expected to attempt resolution within 15 working days, and is allowed up to 45 days to issue a final order. Any party aggrieved by the final decision can escalate the matter to the Karnataka Gig Workers Welfare Board within 30 days.

What concerns can a gig worker raise?

Gig workers can raise complaints related to suspension, blocking, or deactivation of accounts, termination from the platform, reduction or withholding of payments, unfair penalties, discrimination, unsafe working conditions, or other violations of rights guaranteed under the Act.

What gap does it address?

While many platforms have internal grievance redressal mechanisms, these systems exist outside a formal dispute resolution framework. As a result, gig workers have often reported a lack of resolution to their grievances. Many have complained that platforms quite often turn a blind eye to the workers' woes.

The Karnataka government's move seeks to bring more structure and transparency into the process and ensure legal recourse for these workers outside the formal economy. Gig workers can now officially lodge grievances through the portal, which will then be routed to the respective platform's IDRC. The government, as a central facilitator, will monitor the process.

Why is the mechanism being implemented now?

The Karnataka Platform-Based Gig Workers (Social Security and Welfare) Act, 2025, was officially notified in September 2025.

In March 2026, Karnataka became the first Indian State to notify the Rules to enact the law for gig workers. The grievance-redressal mechanism for gig workers in the State forms a crucial part of the Act. It is considered a major deterrent that would hinder arbitrary terminations or account deactivation of gig workers and address their concerns.

What are the other key developments related to the Act?

In January 2026, the Karnataka

Platform-Based Gig Workers Welfare Development Board was constituted to implement welfare measures.

Platforms have been mandated to furnish details of both the company and their gig workers – including name, age, phone number, Aadhaar number, UAN, and bank account details – to the Board. This data will be integrated into the Board's portal.

According to the government, so far, around 12 platforms/aggregators have provided details of 12 lakh active gig workers in the State.

However, given that several workers are associated with multiple platforms, the numbers could contain overlaps. This is expected to be sorted once the government comes up with unique IDs for each worker.

In February, the government announced that 1% of every transaction will be collected from aggregator platforms to provide social security benefits to platform-based gig workers.

What will the welfare fee be used for?

The welfare fee will go to the Karnataka Platform-Based Gig Workers' Fund to provide social security and welfare benefits to platform-based gig workers in the State.

According to government officials, schemes for gig workers, depending on the platform they work for, are being developed and will be put forward for deliberation at the next board meeting. The schemes being considered include life insurance, accidental benefit, disability benefit, medical benefit, maternity benefit, and old-age protection, depending on the nature of gig work.

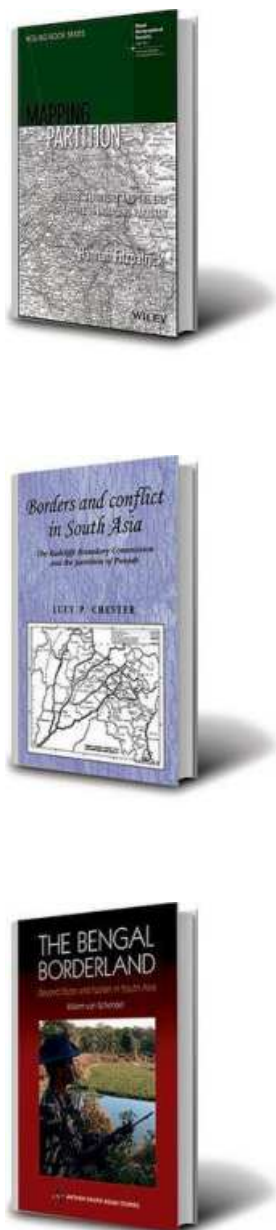

Geography, data, and disagreement in drawing India’s Partition boundaries

The division of the country in 1947 was as much a failure of geographical certainty as it was a political compromise; the Boundary Commission struggled with contested maps, unclear data, and competing demands of territorial contiguity and demographic realities

Osakar Spate, one of the only geographers associated with the Punjab Boundary Commission in India, regularly wrote in his private journals about the fundamental conflict between the political demand for Pakistan and the geographical realities of its implementation. Spate was hired by the Ahmadiyya community to help prepare their claims for the Boundary Commission, and while he did prepare extensive maps and documents for them – and for the Muslim League – his unease anticipated a key strand of tension between geography and political reality that the Boundary Commission had to contend with throughout its tenure.

This tension is explored in greater detail in *Mapping Partition: Politics, Territory and the End of Empire in India and Pakistan* (Wiley) by Hannah Fitzpatrick. The book studies the role and mobilisation (or lack thereof) of geographical knowledge and expertise for the process of partitioning. It begins by tracing the evolution of a colonial archive of geographical knowledge on the Indian empire as represented in maps, census figures, gazetteers, ethnological reports, and atlases. Fitzpatrick argues that this knowledge was closely tied to colonial rule long before it was used in the partition of the subcontinent.

The book examines several different

boundary proposals submitted to the Punjab Boundary Commission to highlight how the Commission’s terms of reference, which required territorially contiguous religious majorities, often required solutions that put geographical realities in direct competition with demographic and political imperatives. For instance, solutions like enclaves or protected corridors could address the need to have demographically homogenous territories, but not the requirement of territorial contiguity; while contiguous boundaries often left large sections of Muslim and non-Muslim populations stranded, leaving large-scale population transfers as the only viable option. Part of the difficulty, as Spate himself noted, was precisely that the Boundary Commission sought to apply a geographical and territorial solution for a conflict that was, at its core, political.

An additional problem was the lack of clarity over what constituted accurate data. In *Borders and Conflict in South Asia: The Radcliffe Boundary Line and the Partition of Punjab* (Manchester University Press), Lucy Chester notes that the Commission’s mandate required it to take into consideration “other factors” while delimiting a boundary, but what these other factors meant was only vaguely defined. The ambiguity led to varying interpretations of what data was to be given precedence and the weight and value to attach to each of these, making it virtually impossible to agree on

one boundary line. Indeed, when the final boundary award was announced by Sir Cyril Radcliffe, the Commission’s chair, both Congress and Muslim League leaders lamented that the Commission hadn’t taken into consideration the “right” factors in fixing a boundary.

Additionally, access to official Survey of India maps had been greatly restricted since World War II, meaning each delegation seemingly prepared its own maps. These maps, which displayed the wide disagreements over questions of space and territory that the Commission had to navigate, ranged from conflicting depictions of living patterns, documents on socio-economic resources, the Railways, or Punjab’s canal network. Thus, while it was clear that geographical knowledge was crucial to the making of the boundary, what precisely constituted useful knowledge and its accuracy was much less clear.

Similar concerns over the credibility of data marked the partition process in Bengal, which was also impacted by the regional topography in unique ways. Willem van Schendel’s *The Bengal Borderland: Beyond Nation and State in South Asia* (Anthem South Asian Studies) studies how the Radcliffe Line came together as a “patchwork border”, as complicated by the era’s politics as it was disrupted by geography. As van Schendel shows, not only did the Bengal Boundary Commission have to work without updated maps, it also had to contend with

unique topographical features like shifting rivers and deltaic tidal islands of the Sundarbans. In several sections where maps were found to be inaccurate or simply absent, the Commission had no prior reference point upon which it could base its boundary award.

Even as India and Pakistan both accepted the Radcliffe Award as the final boundary, what it meant on the ground was unclear. Consequently, as van Schendel notes, the demarcation of a boundary was less a question for geographical or boundary-making expertise, but more a problem for local bureaucracies and governments to settle. What makes *The Bengal Borderland* particularly interesting is its focus on the decades after 1947, when the boundary was translated from a line on paper to one on the ground - and the long-lasting impact this territorial engineering had on the region’s inhabitants.

If Fitzpatrick and Chester show how geographical expertise was limited and, more to the point, deeply contested, *The Bengal Borderland* offers a glimpse into how geography acted on boundary-making efforts. Ultimately, as the books show, what was at stake wasn’t the application of cartography or geographical practice to society, but deciding which vision of space would become real. Suvendu's aide killed in Bengal post-poll attacks

Kolkata Police Commissioner Ajay Kumar Nand said action will be taken against police officers who were present at New Market during the incident but did not prevent it.

In a clash at the Nazat police station in Basirhat Police district, five police personnel, including two CAPF personnel, were injured. Fifteen persons have been arrested in connection with the incident.

The West Bengal BJP leadership, including Samik Bhattacharya and Mr. Adhikari, have urged party supporters to shun violence. Mr. Adhikari said BJP workers should not eye Trinamool party offices as illegal activities were conducted on those premises.

"I am not supporting any violence, but do not compare the situation with 2021 when the Trinamool won," Mr. Adhikari said. He said that in 2021, over 12,000 FIRs were filed and 57 persons were killed.

Jockeying intensifies for CM's post in Kerala

The letter by "Concerned Citizens of Kerala" to Mr. Gandhi, the Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha, said reports that AICC general secretary K.C. Venugopal had staked a strong claim to the post despite not having contested in the Assembly election had "disturbed Congress workers and democratic minds" in Kerala.

The faction fighters also sought to draw a fine distinction between Mr. Venugopal's role as an "election manager" and Mr. Satheesan's "political leadership".

The letter also noted that "public sentiment in Kerala carried a moral force" and recalled how popular demand had forced the CPI(M) to reverse its decision to keep party veteran V.S. Achuthanandan out of the fray in the 2016 Assembly election. "People here instinctively resist attempts to deny political recognition to those who earn it through struggle and public acceptance," the faction warned.

Meanwhile, disparate groups supporting Mr. Satheesan, Mr. Venugopal and senior leader Ramesh Chennithala upped the ante in what appeared to be a three-way leadership war in the party.

Nicobar project ratified without 50% quorum

In the supplementary affidavit filed by an official of the Tribal Welfare Department, the A&NI administration has argued that due process was followed under the FRA to hold special gram sabhas, with "prior notice and proper quorum", which passed resolutions on forest rights of the people and consented to the diversion of forest land for the project. The administration also justified its prior notice of one day for such meetings.

"It is irrelevant to say that tribal communities were excluded from the FRA process," the administration said, because their "adequate representation" had been ensured in the Sub-Divisional Level Committee (SDLC), which had accepted the gram sabha resolution and recommended for clearance under the FRA.

Responding to this, the petitioner, in an affidavit has further made the point that regardless of the quorum at these gram sabhas, the Nicobarese and Shompen tribal communities are not covered under the gram sabha structure and are represented through the Tribal Council instead, which should have been the appropriate body to consult with and seek consent from. The petitioner also pointed out that dozens of names of attendees appeared in all three gram sabha meetings and in some cases, names were found repeated in the list of attendees of the same gram sabha as well.

If Iran agrees to deal, war could end: Trump

In a separate post on Wednesday, Mr. Trump said the war could come to an end and the strait would be opened for all if Iran accepted a deal.

"Assuming Iran agrees to give what has been agreed to, which is, perhaps, a big assumption, the Epic Fury will be at an end, and the highly effective Blockade will allow the Hormuz Strait to be OPEN TO ALL, including Iran," Mr. Trump said. "If they don't agree, the bombing starts, and it will be, sadly, at a much higher level and intensity than it was before," he added.

Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) said on Wednesday transit through the strait would become safe as the security situation in the Persian Gulf improves "with the aggressor's threats neutralised".

Iran's state media reported on Wednesday that the country had officially launched a new mechanism to govern maritime traffic through the strait. "Under the newly implemented system, all vessels intending to transit the Strait will receive an email from the official address info@PGSA.ir outlining the rules and regulations for passage," according to a report by Press TV.

Ships are required to obtain a transit permit before crossing the strait, it said.

CJI's role in CEC, EC appointments was temporary, pending new law: SC

Court's observation was in response to pleas challenging a 2023 Act, which replaced the CJI with a Union Minister on the selection panel; petitioners argue this law overrides a Constitution Bench judgment which sought a panel of PM, LoP, CJI

The Supreme Court on Wednesday said the Chief Justice of India's involvement in the appointment of the Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) and Election Commissioners (ECs) was only meant to last until Parliament came up with a law.

The court's observation was in response to multiple petitions challenging the Chief Election Commissioner and other Election Commissioners (Appointment, Conditions of Service, and Term of Office) Act of 2023.

The petitioners, who include the Association for Democratic Reforms and activist Jaya Thakur, said the 2023 law clothed the political executive of the day with a dominant, if not "exclusive", control over the appointment of the CEC and ECs.

The law was introduced in December 2023, ostensibly to countermand a Constitution Bench judgment in March the same year.



This judgment had declared that CEC and EC appointments should be made on the recommendation of a committee of the Prime Minister, the Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha (LoP) or the leader of the largest Opposition party in the Lok Sabha, and the Chief Justice of India (CJI).

The court had ordered that its judgment would remain operative till "Parliament makes a law in consonance with Article 324(2) of the Constitution".

Consequently, the government brought the 2023 Act, replacing the CJI with a Union Cabinet Minister in the committee. The current CEC, Gyanesh

Kumar, was the first to be appointed to the office under the new law.

'Prime Minister's man' On Wednesday, senior advocate Vijay Hansaria, appearing for the petitioners, said the Constitution framers and the Supreme Court itself had never intended the CEC to be the "Prime Minister's baby or the Prime Minister's man".

Mr. Hansaria submitted that both the Constitution framers and the Supreme Court had warned against leaving the appointment of Election Commissioners exclusively in the hands of the executive.

He referred to the Supreme Court's own observations in the March 2023 Constitution Bench judgment (*Anoop Baranwal v. Union of India*) that the "fierce independence, neutrality and honesty" envisaged in the institution of the Election Commission required an end to government monopoly and "exclusive control" over appointments to the highest poll body.

Prior to the judgment, the CEC and ECs were appointed by the President on the advice of the Prime Minister. The judgment had brought the appointment process on par with that of the CBI Director.

However, Justice Datta highlighted that even the Supreme Court had only intended the judgment to be operative till Parliament passed a law.

"Are you saying Parliament did not have the power to make the law? Or can a mandamus be given to Parliament to make a law only in a certain way?" Justice Datta asked.

Senior advocate Gopal Sankaranarayanan, also for the petitioners, said

their case was not just about the replacement of the CJI with a Cabinet Minister in the committee. It was also about the constitutionality of an Act which had effectively reverted the control over the appointment of CEC and ECs to the Executive.

"The point is Election Commission appointments cannot be under the control of the executive," he submitted.

Mr. Sankaranarayanan said the Anoop Baranwal judgment had addressed a "legislative vacuum". Before March 2023, appointments of the CEC and ECs were made by the President on the advice of the Prime Minister. The "arrangement" had ensured that the power of appointment rested with the Political Executive.

"This mechanism ought to have stopped in the 1950s, but whichever parties came to power found the arrangement convenient," Mr. Sankaranarayanan said.

Arguments would continue on Thursday.

CBI conducts searches in 'cyberslavery' case; 1 held

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has conducted searches at nine locations across four States and arrested one accused on the charge of being part of a network trafficking Indian nationals for "cyberslavery" in South-east Asian countries, primarily Myanmar and Cambodia.

The agency searched the premises of suspects in Delhi, Mumbai, Uttarakhand's Kashipur, and Lucknow, Gonda and Saharanpur in Uttar Pradesh.

"One individual has been arrested in Lucknow for his alleged role in facilitating the trafficking operations. Preliminary findings suggest that agents receive payments in exchange for supplying Indian nationals," the CBI said.

The organised network sent job seekers to these countries on the pretext of lucrative opportunities. "These facilities have been described as hubs of 'cyberslavery', where trafficked individuals are forced to participate in various forms of cyber-enabled fraud," the CBI said.

Rubio may visit India for talks, Quad Foreign Ministers meet in May end

In a visit expected to shore up India-U.S. ties, U.S. Secretary of State Marco Rubio is set to travel to India for bilateral talks and to attend the Australia-India-Japan-U.S. Quad Foreign Minister's Meeting (FMM).

U.S. Ambassador to India Sergio Gora said that he hoped to welcome Mr. Rubio to India "soon". Sources told *The Hindu* Mr. Rubio is expected to be in Delhi from May 24 to 26, his first since taking over as U.S. Secretary of State in January 2025.

"The United States deeply values our growing partnership with India, and we are excited to build even stronger ties that will benefit both our nations and the world," Mr. Gora, who is also U.S. President Donald Trump's Special Envoy for South and Central Asia, said in a post. "See you soon, Mr. Secretary!" he added.

In a separate post after meeting with Delhi Lieutenant-Governor Taranjit Singh Sandhu, Mr. Gora announced that several U.S. Governors would visit India in the months ahead.

Mr. Rubio's visit will include a public reception in Delhi on May 24 to celebrate 250 years of the United States Declaration of Independence. He will hold talks with External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar and National Security Adviser Ajit Doval, and call on

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, in discussions that are expected to set the course for India-U.S. ties after several ups and downs over tariffs and sanctions, as well as the impact of the war in West Asia.

On May 26, Mr. Rubio and Mr. Jaishankar will be joined by Australian Foreign Minister Penny Wong and Japan's Foreign Minister Toshimitsu Motegi for the Quad FMM. Mr. Motegi and Ms. Wong have both visited Delhi in the past

few months, and are expected to travel to India just for the Quad talks. All eyes will be on whether the Quad meet agrees on a date for the Summit, which the government hopes to hold later this year, after trying unsuccessfully to host it for the past two years. In particular, a visit to India by Mr. Trump, who faces mid-term elections in November, will be key to scheduling the Summit.

Major trade deal Indian and U.S. officials are also expected to review the progress in the Bilateral Trade Agreement (BTA) during Mr. Rubio's visit. Although an interim agreement was announced by Mr. Trump and Mr. Modi in February this year, it has missed several finalisation deadlines, and remains unfinished due to uncertainty over the U.S. Supreme Court's decision to strike down Mr. Trump's "liberation day tariffs".

Low-intensity blasts reported near BSF, Army areas in Punjab

Two low-intensity explosions within a span of a few hours were reported near military areas in Amritsar and Jalandhar in Punjab on Tuesday.

Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann blamed the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) over what he termed "small blasts", while State police chief Gaurav Yadav attributed them to Pakis-

tan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI).

A low-intensity explosion was reported from the boundary wall of the Army cantonment on Khasa Road in Amritsar around 11 p.m. on Tuesday. Earlier, around 8 p.m. in Jalandhar, a scooter parked near the headquarters of the Border Security Force's Punjab Frontier caught fire. Investigation is being carried out by the police in coordination with the Army.

BSF recovers suspected Pak. boat off Gujarat coast

An unclaimed boat suspected to be of Pakistani origin was found abandoned in a creek area along the Gujarat coast in Kutch district on Wednesday, officials said.

BSF personnel recovered fishing equipment from the vessel, but no suspicious materials were found. The boat was located near the India-Pakistan maritime boundary in the Arabian Sea.

Investigations are under way to determine the origin of the vessel.

Officials noted that Indian fishermen are prohibited from entering the creek, while Pakistani fishermen have, on occasion, crossed into Indian waters to fish.

Vietnam major pillar of India's Act East Policy, says Modi as defence, rare-earth ties renewed

India's relation with Vietnam is a partnership that does not aim at any other country in the Indo-Pacific region, said senior officials on Wednesday.

The remarks came soon after India welcomed General Secretary of the Communist Party of Vietnam's Central Committee To Lam, who is also the current Vietnamese President.

During a bilateral discussion at Hyderabad House between To Lam and Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the two sides elevated the bilateral relation to the level of "enhanced comprehensive strategic partnership" and signed at least 13 documents, including one on cooperation in critical minerals.

"Vietnam is a major pil-

lar of India's Act East Policy and Vision MAHASEGAR. We have a common outlook in the field of Indo-Pacific. With our strengthening ties in the field of defence and security, we are helping rule of law, peace, stability and prosperity. India will expand ties with ASEAN through its relation with Vietnam,"

House by Mr. Modi, Mr. Lam referred to India's support to Vietnam's liberation and said, "We will never forget that Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru was the first foreign leader to visit Vietnam in 1954, just one week after the liberation of Hanoi."

In a joint statement, the two sides welcomed the steady progress in the implementation of the defence Lines of Credit (LoC) extended by India to Vietnam, acknowledging that the LoC helped "Vietnam's defence capabilities" and advanced bilateral defence cooperation.

The Ministry of Public Security in Vietnam also firmed up plans to enhance work with the National Security Council Secretariat of India.

The visiting side also sealed thirteen documents

with India, including an MoU between the Reserve Bank of India and the State Bank of Vietnam on cooperation in the area of Payment Systems and innovation in digital payments as well as an MoU on radioactive and rare earth minerals.

Earlier in the day, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh held a bilateral meeting with Vietnam's Deputy Prime Minister and Minister of National Defence, Phan Van Giang in New Delhi reaffirming the strong momentum in India-Vietnam defence relations.

The discussions focused on expanding cooperation in maritime security; defence industry collaboration; and joint research. The two sides also stressed the need to enhance regular military interactions

First BJP govt. in West Bengal will be sworn in on Saturday

The Chief Minister and a few members of the Council of Ministers of the first Bharatiya Janata Party government in West Bengal will be sworn in on Saturday.

The day is considered auspicious in the Bengali calendar. *Pachise Baishak* (25th day of the Bengali month of Baishak) is celebrated across the State, as it marks the birth anniversary of Nobel laureate Rabindranath Tagore.

West Bengal BJP president Samik Bhattacharya told presspersons that a meeting of BJP MLAs-elect will be held on Friday. The BJP government will be sworn in the next day, he said.

"The meeting of BJP legislators-elect will be held at 4 p.m. on May 8. The new BJP government will take oath at 10 a.m. on May 9 at Brigade Parade Ground," Mr. Bhattacharya announced on Wednesday.

He said Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah and several Chief Ministers from BJP and National Democratic Alliance-ruled States are expected to be present during the cere-

mony. Mr. Bhattacharya also visited the State Secretariat, Nabanna, and discussed arrangements for the swearing-in with the Chief Secretary.

With the BJP securing 207 of the 293 Assembly seats that went to the polls, all eyes are on who will be

sworn in as the next Chief Minister of the State.

BJP leader Suwendu Adhikari, who defeated Trinamool Congress chairperson Mamata Banerjee in Bhabanipur, described himself as a "disciplined" worker of the party.

He said he would follow the directions of the party leadership. Mr. Adhikari added the party would take a call on which of the two seats he won - Bhabanipur and Nandigram - he would retain.

Alongside speculation

over the post of the Chief Minister, there are talks in the party on ministerial berths. Senior BJP leader Dilip Ghosh, former Rajya Sabha member Swapan Dasgupta, Siliguri MLA Sankar Ghosh, prominent woman face Agnimitra Pal, and the party's senior-most leader, Tapas Roy, are among the top contenders.

Meanwhile, newly elected Trinamool Congress members held a meeting at party supremo Mamata Banerjee's residence, with senior-most party leader So-

vandeb Chattopadhyay likely to be appointed the Leader of the Opposition.

During the day, West Bengal Chief Electoral Officer Manoj Kumar Agarwal met Governor R.N. Ravi at the Lok Bhavan to complete the statutory formalities of handing over the Gazette notification containing names of elected members of the new Assembly.

On security deployment
In a separate development, additional police deployment and area security arrangements outside the residences of Mamata Banerjee and Abhishek Banerjee at Harish Chatterjee Street and Harish Mukherjee Road, respectively, were withdrawn following a review, though their existing security categorisation remains unchanged.

Senior officials of the Kolkata Police and the West Bengal police said that both Ms. Banerjee and Mr. Banerjee would continue to get police protection.

"In accordance with the 'Yellow Book' protocol, the former Chief Minister will be accorded Z-Plus category security," West Bengal Director-General of Police Siddh Nath Gupta said.

Voices of dissent emerge in Trinamool as leaders blame IPAC, ticket choices

In the wake of defeat in the Assembly election, voices of dissent have surfaced within the Trinamool Congress, with some leaders blaming political consultancy firm Indian Political Action Committee and the party's functioning for the electoral setback.

Trinamool's outgoing Rajganj MLA Khageswar Roy blamed the IPAC for the party's defeat. "We had to go according to the IPAC's instructions. The IPAC played a major role in who got ticket in the election. The party and the IPAC together caused this massive defeat," Mr. Roy said.

Athlete Swapna Barman had replaced Mr. Roy as the Trinamool candidate from Rajganj, though he won in 2021. He said that Ms. Barman's lack of political experience led to her loss from a seat where the Trinamool had won four times in the past.

He said no local leaders were consulted by the party or the IPAC before changing candidates, which led to the defeat.

Former Trinamool MLA and district president Sourav Chakraborty expressed frustration regarding the party's performance and

internal strategy after the poll setback.

"This is bad candidate selection. Everyone loves and trusts *Didi* [Trinamool chairperson Mamata Banerjee]. New people were brought in by the IPAC," Mr. Chakraborty said. He also added that the party needs to rethink its strategy and relationship with the IPAC for some real change.

Minister quits party

Another outgoing Trinamool MLA and Minister of State for Sports and Youth Affairs, former Indian cricketer Manoj Tiwary, quit the party soon after its loss alleging corruption within the ranks. "*Paap baap keo chare na* [Sins do

not spare even the father]," Mr. Tiwary posted on social media.

"I faced multiple obstacles at every step while trying to do my work in the last five years... [former Sports Minister] Aroop Biswas did not let me work; they brought me into politics to use me," Mr. Tiwary said in a video message.

He also alleged that he was coerced into joining the party and fighting the 2021 election as a Trinamool candidate.

Famous Bengali singer Kabir Suman, also a former Trinamool MP, told the local media that he was not a fan of the party and that he was coerced into contesting on their ticket in the past.

Cong. steps up attack on BJP over 'vote theft', 'electoral engineering'

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Wednesday alleged that a significant number of BJP MPs in the Lok Sabha had won their seats through vote *chori* (theft). The ruling party would struggle to cross even 140 seats if the elections were held fairly today, he said.

In a post on X in Hindi, he said that "every sixth" BJP MP among its 240 Lok Sabha members had secured victory through electoral manipulation.

"They are not hard to identify - should we, in the BJP's own parlance, label them '*ghuspathiya*' [infiltrator]? And what of Haryana? There, the entire

government itself is '*ghuspathiya*'. The very institutions they keep in their pockets - the ones they manipulate to distort voter lists and the electoral process - are themselves 'remote-controlled,'" Mr. Gandhi said. "Their real fear is the truth. For, if fair elections were held, they would not be able to win even 140 seats today," he added.

Congress spokesperson Pawan Khera sharpened the attack, accusing the BJP of "systematic electoral engineering". He said electoral rolls were being "de-

liberately manipulated" and democratic institutions "compromised" to produce favourable outcomes, particularly in West Bengal and Assam, which he termed "manufactured verdicts".

"*Abki baar loktantra ka antim sanskar* [This time, final rites of the democracy]," Mr. Khera said, alleging that democratic processes had been hollowed out. Citing seats where deletions under the special intensive revision (SIR) were higher than the margin of victories, he called for judicial intervention.

The Governor accepted Mr. Sarma's request to dissolve the 15th Assam Legislative Assembly. He asked him to continue as the caretaker Chief Minister till the oath-taking ceremony.

Mr. Sarma told presspersons that the new Ministry

would be sworn-in after May 11, by when the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) Legislature Party leader would be elected.

On Tuesday, the BJP Parliamentary Board appointed Union Minister J.P. Nadda the central observer and Haryana Chief Minis-

ter Nayab Singh Saini the co-observer for the election of the Assam BJP Legislature Party leader.

"Following the election of the leader, we will hold an NDA (National Democratic Alliance) meeting for a proposal to support the BJPLP leader," Mr. Sarma said. He said the meeting would be held on or before May 11. "We will get to know the date from Nadda ji's office by tomorrow," he added.

A BJP spokesperson said Prime Minister Narendra Modi was likely to attend the oath-taking ceremony.

No word on Nishant's inclusion ahead of Cabinet expansion

Ahead of the Cabinet expansion of the Samrat Choudhary-led National Democratic Alliance government in Bihar on Thursday, Patna witnessed intense political activities. There was speculation that Nishant Kumar, son of former Chief Minister and JD(U) president Nitish Kumar, could be inducted into the new Cabinet.

Senior JD(U) leaders held several meetings in Patna on Wednesday, including at the residence of the party's national working president, Sanjay Jha, leading to speculation over the possible political debut of Mr. Nishant. Later, the leaders also met Mr. Nitish.

The Cabinet expansion event scheduled to be held on Thursday at Gandhi Maidan here is expected to be attended by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Union Home Minister Amit Shah, BJP president Nitin Nabin and other senior

NDA leaders. However, no official confirmation has come out yet on Mr. Nishant's inclusion.

Second leg of yatra
Mr. Nishant is currently on the *Sadbhav Yatra* across the State. He started the campaign from Champaran district on May 3 and will begin the second leg of his yatra from Vaishali on Thursday.

He had earlier indicated that he wanted to strengthen the party organisation and showed reluctance to join the Cabinet. However, speculation remains strong. "If Nishant joins the Cabinet, it will be like wish fulfilment for all party leaders and workers. We want him to lead us," said State JD (U) president Umesh Kushwaha.

Opposition Benches in Rajya Sabha to see many changes after poll results

The sweeping changes in the Tamil Nadu, Kerala and West Bengal State Assemblies as a result of the recent elections are also set to alter the composition of the Opposition benches in the Rajya Sabha, with the Tamilaga Vettri Kazhagam likely to debut in the Upper House in the next round of polls expected in mid-June.

If AIADMK MP C. Ve. Shanmugam, who won from the Mailam Assembly constituency, resigns his Rajya Sabha seat, then TVK could enter Parliament earlier than anticipated.

He told *The Hindu* that he will take a decision on the matter in the next couple of days. If he chooses to resign from the House, then the election for his seat could be held along with 22 other seats from eight States that are due to go to the polls in June. Considering the TVK's strength in Assembly, it should be able to win the seat.

The biggest setback will be for the Left parties. In

April 2027, three Kerala MPs are retiring: the IUML's Abdul Wahab, and the CPI(M)'s John Brittas and V. Sivadasan. The Left Democratic Front's collective strength of 35 seats in the Kerala Assembly is one short of the required number to elect a Rajya Sabha MP. In April 2028, their strength in the Upper House is set to dip further when another three Kerala seats go to the polls. Again, the Left is unlikely to have the numbers to get any of its candidates elected. CPI MP P.P. Suneer, who is scheduled to retire in

2030, will then be the last remaining Left MP in the Upper House.

Impact on DMK

The DMK benches will feel the impact in June 2028 when six MPs from Tamil Nadu are set to retire. Of these, three are from the DMK, two from the AIADMK, and one from the Congress. Considering the Assembly elected on May 4, and the subsequent Congress pledge to support the TVK, the DMK is likely to return only one MP to the Rajya Sabha. For the Trinamool Con-

gress, the first hit will be slightly delayed, coming in August 2029, when the next round of Rajya Sabha elections is held for West Bengal. Six members from the State, five from the Trinamool and one from the BJP, are set to retire, including the Trinamool's Rajya Sabha leader Derek O'Brien. Based on its present strength in the State Assembly, the Trinamool will only be able to get one member elected to the Upper House.

The next round of attrition from the Trinamool's benches is expected in April 2030, when four of its MPs will retire, reducing its strength to six until the next round of Assembly polls in the State.

Between the two rounds of Rajya Sabha elections this year, the Congress will pick up three extra berths.

By the November, the Congress's tally will go up from 30 to 33. The Congress will also increase its strength at the cost of the Left members in the Rajya Sabha in April 2027 and 2028.

India, Algeria hold first joint defence commission meet

India and Algeria held their inaugural Joint Commission meeting in New Delhi on Tuesday, marking a significant step forward in bilateral defence ties. According to the Defence Ministry, the discussions focused on enhancing cooperation in key areas such as training, joint military exercises, medical collaboration, and defence industry engagement. Both sides signed the Rules of Procedure to oversee the implementation of India-Algeria defence cooperation. The meeting was co-chaired by Joint Secretary (International Cooperation) Amitabh Prasad and Algeria's Chief of Staff of the Naval Forces, Major General Kaid Nour Eddine.

CBI files chargesheet in builder-bank nexus case

The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has filed a chargesheet against three companies, their directors, some officials of the Bank of India, ICICI Bank and UCO Bank, and proxy homebuyers in an alleged builder-bank nexus case. The agency alleged a conspiracy by public servants and other private persons to induce homebuyers and investors through false assurances and fraudulent representations. "It was further revealed during investigation that the accused public servants abused their official position to facilitate the illegal acts of the builder in violation of established norms and procedures..." it said.

Overall crime rate drops 6%; cybercrime up by 17%: NCRB

Deaths due to drug overdose saw a 50% increase in 2024 from the previous year's figures; T.N. records the most fatalities; 5,194 cases of offences 'against the state' registered, a rise of over 6%

The overall crime rate in India declined in 2024 from the 2023 figure, but there was an increase of over 17% in cybercrime cases, show the Crime in India, 2024 report released by the National Crime Records Bureau (NCRB) on Wednesday.

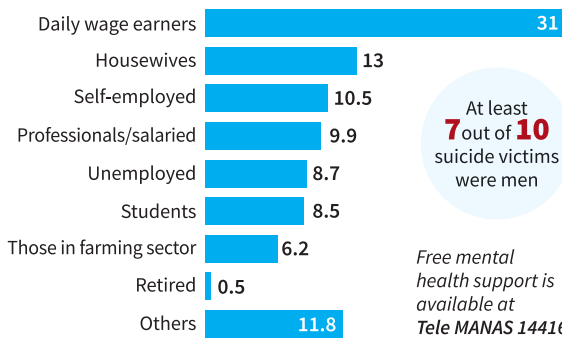
A total of 1,01,928 cybercrime cases were registered in 2024 over 86,420 such cases in the previous year.

"During 2024, 72.6% of cybercrime cases registered were for the motive of fraud (73,987 out of 1,01,928 cases) followed by sexual exploitation with 3.1% (3,190 cases) and extortion with 2.5% (2,536 cases)," the report said.

The NCRB recorded 58.86 lakh cognisable crimes across the country in 2024, marking a 6% decline from the previous year's figure. Of these, 35.44 lakh cases were registered under the Indian Penal Code and the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS) and 23.41 lakh cases under special and local laws. There

were 5,194 cases of offences "against the state" registered in 2024 as against 4,873 in 2023, showing a rise of 6.6%.

"Out of 5,194 cases, 4,395 (84.6%) cases were registered under The Prevention of Damage to Public Property Act, followed by 649 (12.5%) cases under The Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act," the report said.

Crime against SC/ST

The report revealed that a total of 55,698 cases were registered for crimes

against Scheduled Castes (SCs), showing a decrease of 3.6% over the 2023 figure of 57,789 cases. Crimes against Scheduled Tribes showed a sharp decline of 23.1%, dropping to 9,966 cases from 12,960 in 2023.

The NCRB released the Accidental Deaths & Suicides in India (ADSI), 2024 report according to which 1,70,746 suicides were recorded in 2024. Those associated with the agriculture sector, the unemployed, and daily wage workers accounted

for a substantial share of suicidal deaths.

A total of 10,546 persons involved in the farming sector (consisting of 4,633 farmers/cultivators and 5,913 agricultural labourers) died by suicide in 2024, accounting for 6.2%.

Out of 4,633 farmer/cultivator suicides, a total of 4,481 were by men and 152 by women, the report said. Around 31% of the total suicides were reported among the daily wagers, the report said. The number of unemployed people who died by suicide was 14,778 while the number of students and homemakers who ended their lives stood at 14,488 and 22,113, respectively.

Deaths due to drug overdose saw a 50% increase in 2024 from the previous year's figure. The report stated that 978 people died due to drug overdose in 2024, up from 650 deaths in 2023.

Tamil Nadu reported 313 deaths, the highest number of drug overdose deaths, followed by Punjab with 106, Madhya Pradesh 90, Rajasthan 69 and Mizoram 65, according to the NCRB data.

Centre mandates local committees to oversee and govern schools

In a move to decentralise school governance and align with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, the Ministry of Education has issued comprehensive new guidelines mandating the formation of school management committees (SMCs), and granting them financial and operational powers to oversee and govern schools.

The guidelines, which supersede all previous instructions under schemes such as the Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan and the Right to Education Act, were launched by Union Minister for Education Dharmendra Pradhan on Wednesday.

They require every school across the country – including secondary institutions up to Class 12 –

to constitute an SMC within one month of the start of the academic year. "The SMC will replace the existing School Management Development Committees (SMDC) to create a unified, streamlined approach to school leadership," the guidelines said.

The new framework emphasises that education is a "shared responsibility". To ensure grassroots involve-

ment, 75% of an SMC's members must be parents or guardians and 50% must be women. The remaining 25% will include elected local officials, teachers, alumni, and local experts such as Anganwadi workers, ASHA workers, and academics.

"Furthermore, proportionate representation must be given to Socio-Economically Disadvan-

taged Groups, including SC, ST, OBC, and Children with Special Needs," the guidelines state.

The SMC is not just an advisory body but holds significant financial and operational power. "Committees are authorised to execute all school civil works costing up to ₹30 lakh. For projects exceeding this amount, SMCs will participate in the public tendering process (per CPWD/PWD manuals) to ensure quality and transparency," the guidelines said. The SMC will be responsible for reviewing the school budget, preventing financial irregularities, and maintaining accurate records of receipts and expenditures. They must lead drives to bring out-of-school children back into the mainstream and ensure the distribution of uniforms, textbooks, and scholarships.

The inaugural International Big Cat Alliance (IBCA) Summit, to be held here from June 1 to 3, is expected to adopt the first-ever global declaration on big cat conservation. Titled the 'Delhi Declaration', it will articulate shared priorities, strengthen trans-boundary cooperation, and promote a landscape-based approach for conserving big cats and their habitats.

Representatives from 95 countries are expected to participate, the Ministry of Environment and Forests and Climate Change said on Wednesday.

The IBCA is an association of countries that host, or have itinerant populations of at least one of the seven 'big cats' – lions, tigers, leopards, snow leopards, cheetahs, jaguars,

Former Prasar Bharati CEO Shashi Shekhar Vempati has been appointed Chairperson of the Central Board of Film Certification (CBFC). He replaces Praseon Joshi, who has been named the Prasar Bharati Chairman.

Mr. Joshi, a screenwriter and lyricist, who has also worked in advertising, had been helming the CBFC since 2017, before his appointment to the public broadcaster on May 2.

Mr. Vempati had been Prasar Bharati CEO from 2017 to 2022, following which he served in various capacities at the University Grants Commission, television ratings agency BARC, and the Department of Science and Technology. More recently, he has been running AI4India, a forum that has held discussions on fostering a domestic AI ecosystem. He is also on the Board of BharatGen, an IIT Bombay-incubated initiative that is working on Indic language-focused AI models.

Censorship expansion

Mr. Joshi's tenure at the CBFC was characterised by a digitisation effort that culminated in the e-Cine-

pramaan system, used by censor board officials to process applications and hand out certificates. While he rarely discussed his role at the CBFC, film censorship expanded in key areas, such as mention of political personalities and scrutiny of religious themes in cinema. Hundreds of hours of footage were impacted by censorship from 2018 to 2022, a period during which cut lists were readily available. The CBFC shut off ready access to cut lists last year.

The Board faced court challenges in this period from the producers of Vijay-starrer *Jana Nayagan* and BJP MP Kanganana Ranaut-starrer *Emergency*, with both accusing the CBFC of illegally withholding certificates even after examining committees had approved those films.

Vishnu Sahasranamam

The easiest way to self-realisation is through devotion. In today's world where everyone is caught up in a whirlwind of daily mundaneness, even that becomes difficult. However, chanting the Vishnu Sahasranamam puts one on the correct path to achieving the spiritual goal.

In the 1960s, Kanchi Maha Periyava was camping in Ilayatrangudi, near Pudukkottai, home to the Brindavan of Sri Mahadevendra Saraswati, the 65th Pontiff of Sri Kanchi Kamakoti Peetam. Kanchi Maha Periyava always had tremendous respect for Sri Mahadevendra Saraswati. He decided to visit the Brindavan of Sri Mahadevendra Saraswati, meditate and then return for his *bitchai*. This meant he had to walk down a few steps down the road to reach the Brindavan. However, walking on the road would be tantamount to erosion of *acharam* (traditional norms). This norm is applicable to saints. It is also forbidden to have a bath (a cleansing ritual at other times) after visiting a Brindavan, as a way of circumventing the break with *acharam*.

Maha Periyava asked a couple of women to recite the Vishnu Sahasranamam as he walked down the road, and all the other devotees joined in. After completion of Adhishthana darshan, they returned to camp and Periyava had his *bitchai*. How did the *abacharam* (going against set norms) get negated? The explanation came from Maha Periyava himself. "When we chant Vishnu Sahasranamam or even listen to others reciting it, all faults (*doshas*) are overturned. Even a fall in the practice of prescribed norms is corrected by this. Vishnu Sahasranamam is an excellent protective armour for all." One should chant it every day.

'HDFC Bank review finds no major governance concerns'

Law firms reviewing governance at HDFC Bank are set to report this month that they have not found any major lapses, two people with direct knowledge of the findings said, clearing the way for the reappointment of its CEO. India's largest private lender by assets called in Mumbai-based Trilegal and Wadia Ghandy & Co after Atanu Chakraborty resigned as CMD in March citing "incongruence" between his personal values and bank practices. He did not elaborate. The resignation was followed by a 13.81% drop in the bank's share price, or \$16 billion in the stock's value and prompted a rare statement from the central bank seeking to allay investor and depositor concern about a lender deemed too big to fail. It also threw into doubt the lender's application at the central bank due May-end to reappoint CEO Sashidhar Jagdishan. **REUTERS**

SP Group \$3 bn refinance: unit suffers debt downgrade

An Indian rating agency has downgraded a bond issued by Goswami Infratech, a Shapoorji Pallonji (SP) Group unit, citing delays in group-level fundraising versus earlier timelines and highlighting mounting refinancing risks. The real estate and civil engineering firm's non-convertible debentures were downgraded to B+, from BB-, CareEdge said on Wednesday. Shapoorji Pallonji Group did not immediately respond to a Reuters request for comment. Goswami Infratech's plan to raise between \$2.8 billion and \$3.1 billion over the past few months has been delayed, with the surge in rupee hedging costs playing a major role. The company has now planned to split its fresh fundraising between dollar and rupee bond issues, and would target the issues before the end of June, merchant bankers said. The firm raised \$1.51 billion in June 2023 via this bond issue. **REUTERS**

Russia's share in Indian oil imports jumped in March

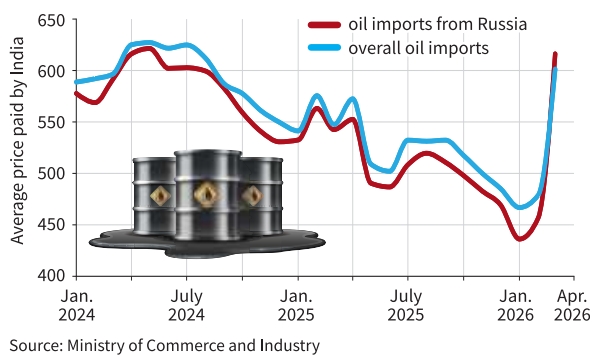
Outbreak of West Asian crisis hit India's Gulf oil supplies, making it turn to Russia; however, India is now getting Russian oil at a premium of 2.5% compared with a discount of 3.9% in 2025-26

The West Asia crisis and the resultant supply constraints have meant that not only has Russia's share in India's oil imports jumped once again, but this time India is paying a substantial premium for Russian oil rather than the discount it was enjoying earlier. An analysis by *The Hindu* of the latest data from the Ministry of Commerce and Industry shows that Russia's share in India's oil imports stood at 33.3% or one-third in March 2026, the first months after the West Asia crisis began. Simultaneously, the shares of the Gulf countries as well as the U.S. have fallen. However, India is now getting Russian oil at a premium of 2.5% as compared with an average discount of

Pricey purchases

3.9% it had received earlier in 2025-26.

Dynamic strategies

In the run-up to the West Asia crisis, India was in the process of cutting back on Russian oil in an effort to align with U.S. interests and push forward a trade deal with that country. In

February, Russia's share had been 25% and in January, it had fallen to a 41-month low of 19%.

However, once the U.S. and Israel attacked Iran on February 28 and Iran retaliated by closing the crucial Strait of Hormuz, India had little choice but to look back to Russia as a major

oil supplier. In fact, in early March, the U.S. Treasury Department, too, issued an order to "allow" India to buy Russian oil for a period of 30 days. While India has maintained throughout that it retains the autonomy to decide where it imports oil from and how much.

Russia dependence

The data shows India substantially cut back on the volume of its overall oil imports in March 2026, likely because about a third of India's crude oil supplies depended on the Strait of Hormuz.

Total oil imports came in at 15.8 million metric tonne (MMT), down nearly 23% over February, and 41% lower than in March last year. However, out of this, Russia's share jumped to 33.3% even as India's Gulf supplies fell sharply.

RIL refinery to shut for maintenance after Nayara restarts

A part of Reliance Industries' 33 million tonne per annum refinery would be heading for planned maintenance shutdown after Nayara Energy's Vadinar refinery returns to operations, Sujata Sharma, Joint Secretary at the Ministry of Petroleum Ministry told reporters on Wednesday.

"Right now, Nayara [Energy's] refinery is under shutdown which will come back mid of this month or before that, after that Reliance [refinery's] planned maintenance" shutdown will start," the bureaucrat said.

Planned maintenance shutdowns are routine at refineries. They are undertaken to sort repair work, preserve life cycle of equipment and ensure safety during operations. It takes about four weeks for refineries to complete planned maintenance and

return to operations.

Ms. Sharma elaborated that the government was seeking to ensure shutdown of refineries was regulated such that all of them do not shut down together.

"We in the Ministry try to ensure all the shutdowns do not happen at one time, and it is scattered so that the supply for domestic market is not affected," she stated while elaborating on maintenance shutdowns.

SEBI terms indices with over ₹20,000-cr. AUM as 'significant'

Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) specified that a Benchmark or Index that mutual fund tracks is a 'significant index' if it has assets under management (AUM) worth

beyond ₹20,000 crore.

In a circular, SEBI said the threshold would be tested every six months.

"It is specified a Benchmark or Index (including index of indices) based on listed securities shall be considered as 'Significant Indices', if the daily aver-

Zee sues Reliance-Disney over alleged music copyright breach

agreements expired, court documents show.

Zee is seeking \$3 million in damages, alleging unauthorised use and exploitation of works from its music division on the Reliance-Disney streaming platform and some of its TV channels, according to

previously unreported court papers seen by Reuters. The lawsuit, filed in New Delhi and reported by Reuters for the first time, marks the latest legal clash between Zee and the group formed from Reliance and Disney's \$8.5 billion merger in 2024.

L&T bags up to 15,000-cr. order from JSW Steel

Homegrown rival Mahindra & Mahindra Ltd. came second with 5,413 units, up almost 64% followed by JSW MG Motor India with 5,006 units, a growth of 32.5%.

In the electric two-wheeler segment, FADA said total sales were at 1,48,740 units last month compared with 92,538 un-

its in April last year, up 60.7%.

TVS Motor Company was the segment leader with 37,683 units last month compared with 19,976 units in April 2025, up 88.6%.

Bajaj Auto Ltd. came second with 32,898 units against 19,162 units in April last year, a growth of 71.7%. Ather Energy came third with 27,034 units more than double last year.

NMDC raises iron ore prices by ₹200 per tonne

Iran is reviewing U.S. proposal; ties with India are flourishing: Baqaei

'We feel very close to the people of India; we are proud of the history of Iran-India relations, and the leaders of both nations are committed and eager to continue strengthening these good relations,' says Ministry of Foreign Affairs spokesperson

Iran, which defended its sovereignty against two nuclear armed countries is now a superpower, says Esmail Baqaei, the spokesperson of Iran's Ministry of Foreign Affairs. The U.S. and Israel started attacking Iran on February 28 and killed its Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. After 40 days of bombing, U.S. President Donald Trump announced a ceasefire on April 8, but tensions continue in the region. In an interview at the Ministry in Tehran, Mr. Baqaei said Iran is currently reviewing an American response to its peace proposal, and added that Iran's ties with India are "flourishing".

In a press conference in Tehran, when you were asked what means and

support you have to counter the U.S., a super power, you responded by saying that Iran is also a superpower. Could you elaborate on this thought?

It is true that a nation which has demonstrated its determination and resilience in defending its sovereignty and dignity against two nuclear-armed regimes - in my view, that itself is proof that such a nation should be considered a superpower.

What is the current status of talks between the United States and Iran? There has been a lot of draft exchanges,

but where do things stand today?

We are currently studying their latest proposal, which was sent in response to our 40-point proposal. It is under review, and once we complete our assessment of the document, we will submit our response to the Pakistani mediators.

Do you think the gap is too wide to be bridged, or is there still a possibility of reaching an understanding?

You have to consider the very difficult history of Iran-U.S. negotiations. It is true that while we were engaged in dialogue and a di-

plomatic process, they attacked us [In June 2025 and February 2026] - this reflects the deep level of mistrust between Iran and the U.S.

Also, knowing that the nuclear issue has been used as a pretext to exert pressure on Iran means that we need to invest significant time and energy in evaluating all aspects of any potential agreement. As I said, we are currently reviewing their proposals and suggestions, and we will see what happens next.

Donald Trump says Iran is internally divided, and it's unclear who is actually making decisions, with the IRGC saying one thing and the political leadership another. What is your response to these claims?

That is their problem. Perhaps they do not understand how things work in Iran. But we do - we know exactly what is happening here. Fundamentally, we will not be distracted by

such misleading narratives coming from U.S. officials. We will remain focused on our national interests.

How do you see India-Iran relations? People in India would want to know whether Iran will impose any charges on Indian ships passing through the Strait of Hormuz?

We do not charge any country. What we are doing in the Strait of Hormuz is, as a coastal state, taking certain measures in accordance with international law to safeguard our national security and national interests against aggressors.

As for India-Iran relations, the ties between our countries are flourishing. We feel very close to the people of India. We are proud of the history of Iran-India relations. Both countries are members of the Non-Aligned Movement, and I believe the leaders of both nations are committed and eager to continue strengthening these good relations. Israel strikes Beirut for the first time since ceasefire

Israel struck Beirut on Wednesday for the first time since agreeing to a ceasefire with Hezbollah last month, with Israel saying it targeted a commander of the militant group's elite Radwan force in the city's southern suburbs.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Defence Minister Israel Katz announced the action in a joint statement. Israeli media reported that the commander was killed in the strike, but there was no immediate confirmation from the Israeli military or Hezbollah.

The Lebanon ceasefire has underpinned a broader U.S.-Iran truce, with a halt to Israeli strikes in Lebanon being a key Iranian demand. As Iran and the U.S. say they are drawing closer to a deal to halt their conflict, the strikes threaten the ceasefire that halted Israeli attacks on Beirut. Israeli troops have remained in areas south of the Litani River and strikes continued in southern Lebanon.

Iran ally Hezbollah has responded by firing and launching armed drones towards Israeli soldiers.

Israel earlier on Wednesday called for residents to evacuate several villages north of the Litani River, which could represent an expansion of Israel's zone of action.

Talks between Israel and Lebanon have continued, but have largely been at the ambassador level.

High-level meetings Lebanese Prime Minister Nawaf Salam said on Wednesday that it was premature to talk of any high-level meeting between Lebanon and Israel.

Mr. Salam, in comments reported by Lebanon's National News Agency on Wednesday, said shoring up a ceasefire would be the basis for any new negotia-

tions between Lebanese and Israeli government envoys in Washington.

Washington last month hosted two meetings between the Israeli and Lebanese ambassadors to the United States. Hezbollah strongly objects to the contacts.

Since Hezbollah triggered the war by opening fire in support of Iran on March 2, the Lebanese administration led by Mr. Salam and President Joseph Aoun has initiated contacts with Israel in decades, reflecting deep divisions between the Shia Muslim group and its Lebanese opponents.

Mr. Salam said Lebanon was not seeking "normalisation with Israel, but rather achieving peace".

China's top envoy calls for a 'comprehensive ceasefire' in the Iran war

China's Foreign Minister on Wednesday called for a comprehensive ceasefire in the Iran war, in comments that could inject new energy into stalled efforts to end the two-month conflict between the United States and Iran.

Wang Yi said his country was "deeply distressed" by the conflict. He spoke after meeting with Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, who was visit-

ing Beijing for the first time since the war with the U.S. and Israel started on February 28.

China's close economic and political ties to Tehran give it a unique position of influence. The Trump administration is pressing China to use that relationship to urge the Islamic Republic to open the Strait of Hormuz.

Mr. Araghchi said that Tehran was looking forward to China's support for a "new post-war" regional framework.

Moscow snubs Kyiv's unilateral ceasefire, fires dozens of drones

Russia fired dozens of drones at Ukraine in nighttime attacks, Ukrainian officials said on Wednesday, disregarding a unilateral ceasefire announced by Kyiv that began at midnight.

The Russian Defence Ministry claimed that Ukraine hadn't abided by its own ceasefire, saying that air defences shot down 53 Ukrainian drones over Russian regions.

CNN founder Ted Turner dead at 87

Ted Turner, the flamboyant U.S. entrepreneur who transformed television news with the creation of CNN in 1980, has died at the age of 87, the network said on Wednesday.

The moustached southerner, yachting enthusiast and philanthropist, whose empire also included sports clubs, had been suffering from the degenerative disease Lewy Body Dementia.

Cable News Network upended established broadcasting with its dedication to around-the-clock breaking news and shot to global recognition with its coverage of the Gulf War in 1990-91.

The 24-hour network was the first in the United States to run non-stop news and quickly built a worldwide footprint.

Commentators brought live coverage from major events ranging from the collapse of the Soviet Union to the Chinese crackdown on the Tiananmen

Square protests. CNN's decision to keep reporters in Baghdad amid U.S. bombing on the Iraqi capital cemented the network's reputation as an indispensable source of breaking news.

"Ted is the giant on whose shoulders we stand, and we will all take a moment today to recognise him and his impact on our lives and the world," Mark Thompson, chairperson and CEO of CNN Worldwide, said in a statement.

"He was and always will be the presiding spirit of CNN."

CNN's success inspired the creation of other 24-hour news channels including Fox News by long-time Turner rival Rupert Murdoch, MSNBC and countless networks worldwide.

Ahmedabad to host final; no playoff game in Bengaluru

The BCCI on Wednesday announced that the IPL 2026 final will be played at the Narendra Modi Stadium in Ahmedabad on May 31.

The Qualifier 1 will be held in Dharamshala on May 26, while New Chandigarh will play host to the Eliminator and Qualifier 2 on May 27 and 29 respectively, leaving Bengaluru completely out of the mix in the playoff schedule.

According to convention, the summit clash is played at the home of the reigning champion, which in this case is the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium (Royal Challengers Bengaluru).

"Bengaluru was originally designated to host the Final. However, owing to certain requirements from the local association and authorities that were beyond the scope of BCCI's established guidelines and protocols, the venue has been shifted and re-assigned," an IPL media advisory stated.

KSCA disappointed

The Karnataka State Cricket Association (KSCA) "expressed its disappointment", noting that the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium had hosted five league-stage games without glitch.

The Association said that its president Venkatesh Prasad was in touch

with the BCCI.

"The IPL matches conducted in Bengaluru during the current season were widely appreciated for their smooth execution, crowd management, operational efficiency, and overall spectator experience, reaffirming KSCA's capability to successfully host marquee fixtures of such scale and importance," a KSCA statement read.

"Despite our preparedness and willingness to host the playoffs, we understand that the BCCI has taken a decision to allot these matches to other venues," the KSCA added.

The decision is similar to what transpired last year, when the final was moved from Kolkata — home of the then defending champion Kolkata Knight Riders — to Ahmedabad.

"Weather conditions and other parameters" had

been cited as reasons for the change.

Earlier this season, the Karnataka State government and police, after much deliberation, granted permission for the conduct of IPL matches at the M. Chinnaswamy Stadium.

The iconic venue, sidelined after the deadly stampede last year, hosted five league matches in April, with Raipur set to host RCB's other two "home" games on May 10 and 13.

In a departure from norm, the Qualifier 2 and final — conducted in a tight space of three days — will be held in different cities.

The games are usually held in the same city to ensure that the second team which makes the grade does not have to travel.

The playoff schedule: Qualifier 1: May 26, Dharamshala; Eliminator: May 27, New Chandigarh; Qualifier 2: May 29, New Chandigarh; Final: May 31, Ahmedabad.

DC grapples with wide variance in home pitches

Comfort has eluded Delhi Capitals at home in IPL's 19th edition. The Axar Patel-led franchise has won just one out of five matches at the Arun Jaitley Stadium. On its visits to other venues, it has fared much better, notching up three wins in five games.

Contributing to the travails at home has been the large deviation in the nature of surfaces, hindering DC from cultivating a consistent style of play in its backyard. The last three matches in the national capital make for pertinent examples.

Having engaged in a run-fest against Punjab Kings on a featherbed where Shreyas Iyer's side chased down a record 265 on April 25, Capitals' duel against Royal Challengers Bengaluru just two days later swung to the other extreme.

Bhuvneshwar Kumar and Josh Hazlewood extracted swing and seam movement, reducing the host to eight for six inside four overs.

DC folded up for 75 and

lost by nine wickets.

On Tuesday night, the strip in use was on the slower side. DC's batters couldn't adapt quickly enough, allowing Chennai Super Kings to register an eight-wicket victory.

DC head coach Hemang Badani conceded that the lack of homogeneity with the pitches at home wasn't ideal.

At the same time, the 49-year-old explicitly stated that the franchises didn't have a role in the preparation of pitches.

"We don't have any control over the surfaces. There is a clear mandate from the BCCI that it looks after the surfaces and it is the one which ensures that no local side benefits. You play on what is presented to you," Badani told reporters.

"Yes, it's been a bit of an up-and-down curve for us to understand what we are going to get in Delhi. I think the whole competition is quite neutral that way. But ideally, yes, you want to have some consistency"

Arsenal reached the Champions League final for the first time in 20 years as Bukayo Saka sealed a 1-0 win against Atletico Madrid on Tuesday.

Mikel Arteta's side settled the semifinal second leg with Saka's strike late in the first half at an ecstatic

Emirates Stadium.

The Gunners, who drew 1-1 in the first leg in Madrid last week, held firm after Saka's goal to go through 2-1 on aggregate.

Arsenal will face Paris Saint-Germain or Bayern Munich in the final in Budapest on May 30.

It was a cathartic night for Arsenal, which is back in the Champions League final for the first time since

losing 2-1 to Barcelona in its only previous appearance in the showpiece in 2006.

Even Arsene Wenger's 'Invincibles' — who won the club's last English title in an unbeaten top-flight campaign in 2004 — might have to bow to the current generation if they finish the job. Fittingly, it was Saka — the homegrown symbol of the Arteta era — who proved Arsenal's

match-winner.

This was a more prosaic display but no-one with an affinity to Arsenal was bothered in the slightest.

Arsenal was nearly caught on the counter in a frenetic start when Julian Alvarez shot just wide before Giuliano Simeone's close-range effort deflected past the post.

Gukesh sends out a massive message by beating Sindarov

Reigning world champion D. Gukesh on Wednesday sent out a massive message to chess buffs across the globe by beating his challenger for the world crown, Javokhir Sindarov of Uzbekistan in the fifth round of the Super Rapid and Blitz, a part of the Grand Chess Tour, here.

Gukesh had earlier walked out of the main competition of the Grand Chess Tour, citing his form and to focus more on training ahead of his World Championship title defence.

He was, however, in full swing as he matched Sindarov move for move in a rapid encounter. The Uzbek Grandmaster had earlier dismissed claims that

this was an important clash ahead of the World Championship match but his play clearly showed he was under some pressure.

So leads with eight

Can Wolvaardt 2.0 take the Proteas to the promised land?

For a batter who relies on old-school technique to amass runs, the recent series triumph against India showed her in a different avatar. It could augur well for South Africa in England

Laura Wolvaardt 4, India 1. That could very well have been the scoreline in the recent five-match T20I series in South Africa. The only match India won was the one in which Wolvaardt failed to reach 20.

That was in the fourth T20I at Johannesburg, in which she was out for 18. That was the game in which Deepti Sharma regained her touch as one of the premier all-rounders in the women's game, claiming five wickets after making an unbeaten 36 off 26 balls. The visitors won by 14 runs, but the South Africans had already clinched the series.

The rubber had been decided in the previous match, which was also played at the Wanderers. And that game produced one of the best knocks in women's cricket of late. Wolvaardt's 115 off 53 balls was a masterclass in T20 batting.

The 27-year-old's third hundred in the format helped her team get past the target set by India - 192 - with 3.3 overs remaining. It was the highest successful chase for South Africa. It was Wolvaardt's third T20I hundred, and it was her fastest - off 47 balls. All those records matter, yes.

The way she lorded over the Indian attack, right from the start, mattered too. She, and her opening partner, Sune Luus gave Harmanpreet Kaur's women no chance despite putting on the board what was a challenging total. While the former played the supporting role admirably with a 42-ball 64 not out, the current one destroyed the Indian bowlers; she was generous enough to give a couple of chances, but this was, of course, a series that would not be exactly remembered for India's fielding; even some of its best fielders, like Jemimah Rodrigues, fumbled.

Wolvaardt, of course, made India pay for those lapses. And she did it with some spectacular shots, like she did all through the series. She began by sending Renuka past the midwicket boundary off the first ball of the innings. The swing bowler was later swung for a couple of big sixes on the on-side.

The innings, in particular, showcased how increasingly aggressive Wolvaardt is becoming as a top-order batter. She has always been admired for her elegant batting - her cover drive is pure art - and the way she could anchor her team's innings, or the way she could pace her knock. And talking of her cover drive, Australian great Meg Lanning had once famously replied to an ICC tweet asking fans who had the best cover drive of the generation.

Usual suspects

The international cricket body had put out pictures of some usual suspects: Virat Kohli, Kane Williamson, Joe Root and Babar Azam. Those were lovely pictures,

too, of all the men playing one of the most classical, aesthetically pleasing shots in the game. The images looked especially lovelier as the players were all in their whites.

The picture Lanning posted of Wolvaardt had the South African in yellow and green - because she hadn't played a Test yet and there sadly are far too few games for women in the longest - and greatest - format. But, that image still brought out the beauty of the lady's cover drive. Come to think of it, there is no gender to the sheer art of batting. Just think of Smriti Mandhana; she is as stylish as a male left-hander.

Women's cricket needs entertainers like Smriti and Wolvaardt. The game may have taken off in a big way in India - the ODI World Cup victory could not have been timed better - the WPL and The Hundred may be bringing in new fans, but it is still evolving. There is potential for the sport to grow further. And for that, superstars like Wolvaardt can be handy.

She could inspire a lot more young girls in her country. Women's cricket had received a major boost when the team reached the final of the T20 World Cup in 2023 at home. South Africa went down to the invincible Australia in the final.

All-rounder Marizanne Kapp had told this writer back then how much it meant to become the first senior South African team - male or female - to reach a World Cup final. "The support we received at the World Cup from the crowds was amazing," she said. "But, still you won't be remembered for playing the semifinals, you will be remembered for winning World Cups. We can't get stuck on us reaching the final."

Well, three years later, South African women are still stuck there. They played the final of the 2024 T20 World Cup against New Zealand and then the 2025 ODI World Cup final against India.

In last November's final at the DY Patil Stadium, the host had asked the South Africans to chase at nearly six an over. Not an easy task in a final in front of a full house, but as long as Wolvaardt was there, they had hope. She was dismissed for a 98-ball 101 in the 42nd over. Once the opener went, the remaining three wickets fell quickly.

Former India captain Shubhangi Kulkarni rates that innings very highly. "I thought Wolvaardt played brilliantly in the final against India and South Africa was very much in the game when she was at the wicket," she tells *The Hindu*. "She showed great temperament, which I think is her best quality. Under pressure, in crucial roles, in major tournaments, she has been able to perform well."

She had performed alright in the semifinal against England at Guwahati. It was her 169 off 143 balls - she got out off the last ball of the 48th over - that helped South Africa set a far too big total that denied the Englishwomen a third straight final.

Wolvaardt finished the World Cup as its leading scorer, with 571 runs, 137 more than the second-placed Smriti. Apart from two hundreds, she had also hit three fifties and had an average of 71.37.

That World Cup had begun disastrously for Wolvaardt and South Africa though. At the Barsapara Cricket Stadium, the same venue as the semifinal, against the same team, England, she was out in the second over, her leading edge ending up as a return catch to left-arm spinner Linsey Smith. The South African innings lasted just four balls more than a T20I innings, and totalled 69.

After England chased down that score in just 14.1 overs, Wolvaardt addressed the media. One recalls how calmly she took on the questions from the reporters on that October evening. "We are a much, much better side than 69 all out," she had said. "We spent a lot of time in these conditions in the last couple of months, so definitely wouldn't put it on the wicket."

That was a captain talking. She sounded confident that her team could bounce back despite a poor start and it was such a long tournament, with every team getting

seven games in the league stage. South Africa indeed bounced back. And Wolvaardt led from the front.

"She has been an excellent captain," says Shubhangi. "She is a leader, and has shown a lot of maturity."

The Pune-based veteran rates Wolvaardt as one of the best batters of all time in women's cricket. "She is technically correct and is a classical batter, and I was really surprised she was not bought by any franchise at the inaugural WPL in 2023 (she came in as a replacement for Gujarat Giants' Beth Mooney, who was injured in the opening game of the tournament)," she says. "She plays proper cricketing shots and is good across formats."

Wolvaardt has played just four Tests, though. She has a hundred and fifty from them. She averages a remarkable 51.30 in ODIs. No current player has a better number. She has 5695 runs in the format, with 13 hundreds and 40 fifties. In T20Is, apart from the three hundreds, she has 16 fifties.

Yes, some of those came against India in the recent series, in which her scores read 51, 54, 115, 18, 92 not out. She could not have timed those innings better, either: the T20 World Cup in England is just five weeks away. Wolvaardt will be determined to make a statement in the group of death. She will do that with flair, you can bet.

Invasive species may be the wrong enemy in a changing subcontinent

India supports roughly 500 million cattle and other livestock, one of the largest such populations in the world, placing heavy grazing pressure on forests and the commons; in such conditions, 'palatable' species are suppressed while thorny, chemically defended, disturbance-tolerant plants persist

Across India, campaigns against invasive alien species (IAS) are gathering administrative and judicial force. Authorities now identify, map, classify, and remove species deemed ecological threats.

In the last year alone, India's English-language press has carried sustained coverage of ecological-loss studies, State eradication drives, and human-wildlife conflicts linked to such species. What was once a niche scientific concern has become a visible public issue and priority.

A recent Tamil Nadu court order even portrayed *Prosopis juliflora* shrubs as a near-Statewide threat. Government submissions have reported its clearance from 517 villages across 32 districts while the academic literature has recorded the species across the State. The plants *Lantana camara* and *Senna spectabilis* face similar campaigns elsewhere in India.

The prevailing assumption is simple: remove the invasive species and ecological recovery will follow.

Before accepting that, however, one must first ask: what condition was the landscape in before these species spread, and what conditions now sustain them?

Three patterns emerge from the evidence.

Physical changes usually came first
Throughout India, native ecological communities had already been transformed before invasive plants became dominant.

Colonial forestry, plantation expansion, and settlement removed vast tracts of forest cover. Millions of hectares were converted to tea, coffee, rubber, teak, and eucalyptus plantations. Diverse habitats gave way to simplified commercial landscapes, with lasting effects on soil biology, shade regimes, and water cycles. Logging, roads, mining, fire suppression, and chemical agriculture fragmented habitats further.

In places like Wayanad, forest edges had already degraded before species like *L. camara* spread into them. Biodiversity and its supporting conditions had already been decimated.

Removing a species alone can't restore what came before. Without functioning ecological relationships, more clearing creates new vacancies, often the very conditions in which another invasive species, or the same one, can quickly return.

P. juliflora was introduced to India in 1877 as part of a misguided ecological experiment. At first seeded from the air, it spread through the guts of cattle that browsed its pods. Then came the 'Green Revolution' and the wider post-independent agricultural intensification. Canals expanded. Borewells multiplied. Fertilizer use surged.

As a result, waterlogging and seepage increased in some regions, depleted aquifers in others, and productivity began to decline on abandoned lands. *P. juliflora* is a deep-rooted phreatophyte that can exploit such altered water and soil regimes. In parts of Tamil Nadu, researchers have linked its surge to irrigation-related moisture conditions.

In other words, the plant was present for decades – what changed was the landscape around it.

Climate change, nutrient loading, land-use change, freshwater disruption,

biodiversity loss, and chemical pollution are reshaping ecosystems worldwide. These are largely the effects of a globalised industrial culture pushing rapid urbanisation and infrastructure expansion.

Over three decades, India's urban governance footprint has roughly doubled, marking a systemic expansion of fragmented, high-disturbance landscapes that extend far beyond city boundaries into peri-urban and rural ecologies.

India also supports roughly 500 million cattle and other livestock – one of the largest such populations in the world – placing continuous and heavy grazing pressure on forests and the commons. In such conditions, 'palatable' species are repeatedly suppressed while thorny, chemically defended, disturbance-tolerant plants such as *L. camara* persist or even expand.

Studies have revealed increasing woody cover across many open landscapes worldwide, partly associated with rising atmospheric carbon and other interacting factors. Fertilizer inputs remain high – India alone uses 35-40 million tonnes of urea per year – and atmospheric nitrogen deposition now adds 10-30 kg per hectare annually across many regions. Woody nitrogen-fixing species such as *S. spectabilis* and *P. juliflora* benefit from such altered conditions.

A deeper invasion

Chemical pesticides have further altered soils and microbial networks. Over time, they can disrupt genes, reduce resilience, intensify pest cycles, and weaken the ecological foundations on which productivity itself depends.

These changes were driven less by individual choice than by policies, infrastructure, and economic systems designed to maximise production at scale. The result: food production must continue yet the same hydrological, chemical, and atmospheric systems that

increase output are also exhausting the land and degrading ecosystems now slated for restoration.

When multiple factors shift together, plant communities reorganise. *P. juliflora* growth is part of wider hydrological and chemical change across the subcontinent. Similar dynamics may apply, in differing ways, to other IAS. These plants may function as ecological first responders – species whose physiology suits rapid changes in landscape conditions.

Given time, other species follow these pioneer species. In the early stages, many may be exotic and fast-moving. Eventually, native species may also re-establish themselves. However, such ecological succession does not guarantee a return to earlier ecological states. As the underlying conditions continue to shift, new ecological assemblages are likely to emerge among the species able to thrive within them.

Life is conditional

Evolutionary and palaeoecological evidence suggests that the world's native biomes developed under very different climatic and nutrient regimes. Grasslands expanded during drier phases of history while rainforests arose and diversified in warmer, wetter conditions. Many species can't easily tolerate the nutrient-rich soils, altered climate or hydrologically changed landscapes of the present.

Some IAS species may also perform compensatory ecological roles. They can accumulate heavy metals, nitrogen, and carbon in biomass, provide cover for smaller wildlife in disturbed landscapes, create conditions into which other species later enter, provide windbreaks, and bind soil. There are, of course, real consequences. Dense thickets of invasive plants can reduce accessible forage for elephants and other herbivores in forests such as the Western Ghats. But these effects unfold in landscapes already altered by logging, plantations, and nutrient enrichment.

Conservation efforts that target only the visible plant thus risk misdiagnosing the problem. It is easier to count acres of IAS removed than to measure shifts in moisture regimes or soil chemistry. Removal alone does not address the underlying drivers. Restoration requires that we read the land comprehensively, understand its history and interacting processes, and work with the ecological and human communities that remain.

What it will take

This does not mean certain species should never be removed but that restoration is difficult and requires attention to ecological processes and biodiversity. It is local, patient, and continuous. Large-scale mechanical removal brings complications of its own. While clearing vast acreages may serve a burgeoning biomass economy, there is little proof that it supports ecological recovery, which needs time.

Fears that invasive species will take over often accompany business opportunities for earthmovers and new employment schemes. A villain, it seems, can animate an economy faster than restoration can.

Communities and practitioners embedded in these habitats are often best placed to undertake careful removal where it makes ecological and cultural sense. Success, however, remains uncertain and can only be judged over years. Restoration should proceed with least harm, phased planting, intergenerational care, and meaningful human livelihoods.

Otherwise, India risks spending much of its conservation energy removing plants that are symptoms of a wider civilisational transformation that it has yet to confront.

Expanding AI gets its biggest testing ground in China

On a recent weekday, around 50 people gathered outside the headquarters of a Chinese mobile Internet company, waiting to get help with installing an artificial intelligence (AI) assistant.

The scene in Beijing, China's capital, was repeated for days at several events and was also seen in the southern technology hub Shenzhen in March, as engineers helped crowds trying to set up the popular AI "agent" OpenClaw on their laptops. "I'm worried about falling behind in technological developments," said Sun Lei, a 41-year-old human resources manager at the Cheetah event. She said she hoped the tool might help her source and screen resumes across various recruitment platforms.

More than a year after OpenAI's Chinese rival DeepSeek stunned the world with its advanced AI model, China has become a testing ground for mass use of AI tools. Chinese people and

businesses have rapidly embraced AI for all sorts of things, from booking and planning travel, ordering food and hailing rides. Of its 1.4 billion population, more than 600 million were using generative AI as of December, a 142% increase from a year earlier, according to a report by the government-controlled China Internet Network Information Centre.

With the recent surge in the use of "agentic" AI like OpenClaw, the consumption of data by AI models has also risen. Measured in what computer scientists call tokens, or units of data such as part of a word, the weekly share used by Chinese AI models has recently surpassed U.S. models, according to OpenRouter, an AI "gateway platform" that tracks data and enforces security across different AI models. "The (AI) competition is clearly shifting from models to ecosystems," said Lizzi Lee, a fellow at the Asia Society Policy Institute's Center for China Analysis focused on economics and technology. "Chinese users are basically acting as real-time testers at scale."

Chinese technology companies like Tencent, Alibaba and Baidu are also racing to commercialise AI. Tencent integrated OpenClaw into WeChat, China's own "super-app" which is a messaging tool that can also be used to order food and make payments.

OpenClaw, originally created by Austrian software developer Peter Steinberger last year, won quick and enthusiastic use thanks to its ability to use various tools to complete complicated tasks. Zhao Yikang, a Chinese college student in Macao, uses OpenClaw in both his studies and daily life. "AI can understand things in a second," Zhao said. "You just need to act as a commander and tell it what to do."

Preparing to start a photo services business after graduation, Zhao asked AI to build a company website. Within 10 minutes, it had generated a fully functional site for less than 5 yuan (₹70).

Chinese companies increasingly are setting internal targets for boosting use of AI to improve efficiency, said Janet Tang, a partner & managing director focused on technology at consultancy AlixPartners.

There are "a lot of application scenarios," said Wang Xiaogang, co-founder of the Chinese AI software company SenseTime and chairman of ACE Robotics. "The industry is developing very fast and the people, they are very open and they're eager to try the AI in a lot of scenarios."
